## LONG DISTANCE USERS ASKED TO LIMIT CALLS

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company is now starting to ask the cooperation of long distance telephone users to limit their conversations over heavily loaded lines to five minutes, according to C. E. Seavey, manager for the company here.

The goal is to speed up telephone traffic over congested routes during hours when demand is heaviest and calls are subject to delay. At such times of peak demand the operator will say at the start of conversation, "Please limit your call to five minutes—others are waiting," according to C. E. Seavey.

## Light Bulbs Used To Heat Small Food Dehydrator

Plans for constructing the home electric food dehydrator developed jointly by the food industries and the agricultural engineering departments at Oregon State college have just been received at the county agent's office in the federal building.

This dehydrator uses electric light bulbs for heat and a small household fan to circulate the warm air. It is recommended only for those who already have access to such a fan as they are difficult if not impossible to buy new. This model contains seven wooden trays with total drying space of about 25 square feet, or enough to serve three or four families. The circular containing plans and directions for construction may be had free from your extension office.

## Mining Requirement Suspended by Ickes For Duration

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes suspended for the duration of the war yesterday a mining law requirement that \$100 worth of work must be performed each year on each of thousands of mining claims in the United States and Alaska in order to retain a right in the claim.

However, he said that the suspension can be granted only if notice of desire to hold the claim without "annual assessment work" is filed by July 1 each year. The suspension was authorized under legislation approved by President Roosevelt this month.
