

SPECIALTIES TAKE TURN ON UPGRADE SIDE

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—As sorted rails and specialties took a late turn on the recovery side of today's stock market while May leaders lingered in losing territory.

Prices slipped at the start. Dealings then slowed and scattered come-backs were in evidence around mid-day. A little buying came in near the close and final trends were no worse than mildly irregular. Transfers for the full proceedings were around 1,000,000 shares. Variations mostly were in minor fractions although isolated gains and losses of 3 or so were observed.

Prominent forward movers included Union Pacific, Santa Fe, American Telephone, Sears Roebuck, Philip Morris and Douglas Aircraft. Downward inclinations were shown by J. I. Case, General Motors, U. S. Steel, Eastman Kodak, Anaconda, Westinghouse and Electric Power & Light.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, May 21 (AP)—Strength in May wheat featured an otherwise dull trade in grains today. While the May contract gained about a cent at times, other deliveries of the bread cereal were only fractionally higher and rye and oats showed little change. Trading in May contracts expires today.

Buying of May wheat reflected some short-covering and purchasing of that contract against sales of deferred deliveries.

May wheat closed at \$1.451-1/2, up 1-3/4. Other wheat contracts were unchanged to 1/4 higher, July \$1.431-1/4. Corn was unchanged, May \$1.05. May oats dropped 11-21, but other deliveries were unchanged to 1/4 lower. Rye was unchanged to 1/4 down.

WPB CLOTHING CHIEF AGAINST RATIONING

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—A. D. Whiteside, chief of WPB's office of civilian requirements, has committed himself to heading off clothing rationing, a war production board spokesman said today, and has won the agreement of influential retailers to a don't-buy-more-than-you-need campaign.

A sweeping program of allocation of textile equipment and manpower—to get the maximum in fabrics and clothes from existing facilities—will be undertaken, the spokesman said, adding that success will depend on the cooperation of consumers and the retail trade.

"Department stores and clothing stores will have to get behind a new idea—to discourage people from buying instead of urging them to purchase all they can afford," said one official who asked that his name not be used.

Low Hahn, general manager of the national retail dry goods association, and several representatives of big New York department stores participated re-

cently in a conference with Whiteside and WPB Chairman Donald M. Nelson in working out opening phases of the plan.
