RATION BOOK NO. 3
June 10—Deadline for mailing application blanks used in obtaining new ration book No. 3. These applications now in process of being distributed to the public by mail.

RATION BOOK NO. 2
May 31—Expiration date of red stamps E, F, G and H. Validation dates of stamps as follows:

June 7—Blue Stamps G, H and J for processed foods expire.

May 31—Stamp No. 12, good for five pounds, expires at midnight.

October 31—Stamps number 15 and 16, good for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning purposes only, expire.

COFFEE
May 30—Stamp No. 23, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
July 21—No. 6 stamps, in "A" book, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

SHOES
June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

FUEL OIL
September 30—Fuel oil—5th period coupon expires.

TIRES
May 31—"C" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 45 days elapsing since last inspection.

June 30—"B" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 60 days elapsing since last inspection.

Sept. 30—"A" and "D" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 90 days elapsing since last inspection.

BUS DESTROYED BY FIRE WHILE BEING TOWED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26 (P)—A Greyhound line motor bus was destroyed by fire as it was being towed into Eugene Sunday night, J. K. Sayre, assistant superintendent of the Oregon division of the line, disclosed today. He said the bus, which had stalled earlier in the day, was unoccupied except for the driver who escaped without injury. The vehicle was a total loss, estimated at between \$7000 and \$10,000. Passengers had been transferred to another bus after the motor had failed. Sayre did not give the cause of the fire.

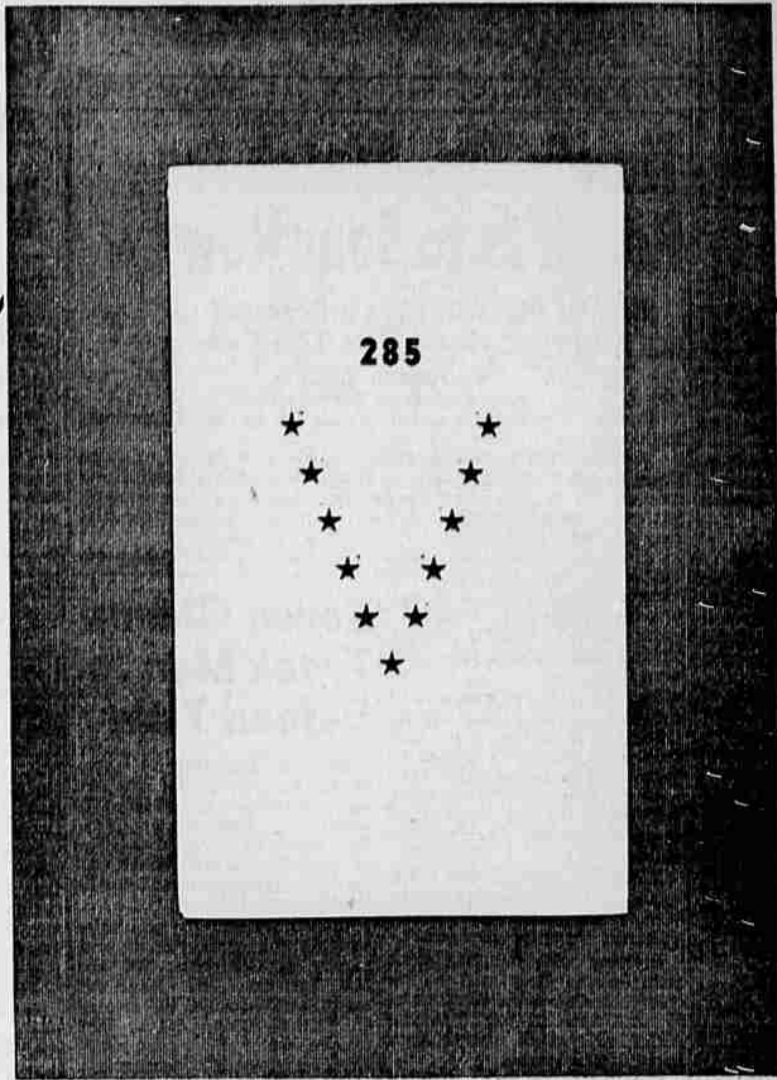
