U. S. BOMBERS MAKE ONE-DAY RECORD BAG

U. S. EIGHTH AIR FORCE HEADQUARTERS, England, May 27 (AP)—British-based United States heavy bombers established a record for a single day's bag by destroying 74 German planes May 21 during the unescorted raids on submarine construction yards at Emden and Wilhelmshaven, it was announced today.

Twelve bombers were lost in this joint action. The record bag of enemy craft brought the total to 297 destroyed in eight raids which embraced 18 targets during May. The previous high for a single day was 64 shot down during the four-way attack on Kiel, Antwerp, Courtrai, France, and Velsen, Holland, May 14, by medium and heavy bombers. Eleven heavy bombers were lost on those raids.

Torpedo Wake Spots Jap Sub for Destroyer Charge

A RAT ISLAND BASE, May 13 (Delayed)—An alert navy Catalina patrol boat crew spotted a Jap torpedo wake off Attu, the second day of the assault landing; located the torpedo's origin and marked it with smoke flares, called destroyers which drew oil with depth charges, and at midnight the destroyer blasted it to bits.

Patrol Plane Commander Lieut. Jess B. Jolly, 27, box 84, Turlock, Calif., and his co-pilot, Lieut. (jg) John I. Murphy, 23, of Jamaica, N. Y., told the story today less than 12 hours after it happened.

"We were a half mile due west of the battleship which was standing off Attu," said Murphy when Jolly saw the torpedo wake headed for the battleship.

DAVIES GETS STALIN REPLY TO ROOSEVELT

MOSCOW, May 27 (AP)—Joseph E. Davies, President Roosevelt's special envoy, said tonight that Premier Stalin, in their final meeting, "gave every indication that he was entirely in accord with the contents of the president's letter" brought here by the American.

He said he based his statement on the cordial atmosphere with which he was received at the Kremlin where last night he received a written and sealed reply from Stalin to President Roosevelt's secret letter.

MOSCOW, May 27 (AP)—Joseph E. Davies announced today he had received a written and sealed reply from Premier Stalin to the secret letter from President Roosevelt which he delivered at the Kremlin last week.

The president's emissary said he did not know the contents of Stalin's message and that it was solely for the United States commander-in-chief.

Davies said he was leaving directly for the United States. A statement issued to correspondents by Davies said: "The answer to your inquiry

"It looked like an outboard motor wake," he said. He reached down and pointed to a crack between the plywood floor which ran the full length of the quonset hut and said: "It was just as straight as that."

The plane then dropped smoke flares along the course and at the point of the torpedo's origin which was clearly visible because of an oil slick.

Jolly added: "A destroyer steamed out full tilt. "After taking soundings it dropped six depth charges after which large oil slicks appeared."

Red-headed Irishman Murphy interrupted. "Boy how those depth charges lifted the ocean! To explain he bent his knees, spread his long arms, and slowly raised. "The whole damn sea came up."
