

VETERAN MADE POPPIES WILL BE SOLD HERE

The crepe paper poppies that will be sold on the streets of Klamath Falls Saturday, May 29 by the American Legion Auxiliary were all made by veterans, says Mrs. J. H. Gallagher, poppy chairman.

There are some veterans whose hands are too crippled to fashion a poppy from the very beginning until it is a full blown flower, so they are allowed to do whatever part of the work they can and the other veterans finish the job. The men are paid one cent for each poppy and if they are not too badly disabled they can earn a fair day's wage without exerting themselves too much.

For the second year the men disabled in World War I have shared their fund raising handiwork with the men of a younger generation, those who have come back recently from the battlefronts in the Pacific and the Mediterranean and even in the north, for hospitalization in their home land.

This year the Camp Fire Girls, Girl Scouts and the Junior auxiliary will assist the Legion auxiliary in the sale of poppies.

Congress to Probe Food Marketing

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Under a unanimous house mandate to investigate the nation's food marketing system, the house agriculture committee laid the groundwork today for an inquiry which Chairman Fulmer (D-S.C.) said he expected to result in bettering the economic position of farmers and consumers.

"Unless I am mistaken," Fulmer said, "we will be able to show that most of the food dollar goes to middlemen, a leech-like link that can be eliminated by streamlining our food distribution system."

Liberian President Makes Shortest Speech to Senate

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—President Edwin Barclay of the West African negro republic of Liberia made one of the shortest speeches the senate ever has heard from a visiting dignitary today, then broke precedent by remaining on the floor as the law-makers resumed their work.

Escorted into the chamber by a committee composed of Senators Hill (D-Ala.), McNary, (R-Ore.), Wagner, (D-N.Y.) and Capper (R-Kas.), Barclay took his place on the rostrum, where he was introduced by Vice President Wallace.

Bowing, he said: "I thank you very much for permitting me to watch for a few minutes the process of law-making of the United States senate."

With that, Barclay sat down.

In a moment Vice President Wallace announced:

"The senate reconvenes and the chair recognizes the senator from Tennessee."

Senator McKellar, piloting an appropriations bill, arose and debate resumed.

The senate always recesses to hear a visiting dignitary since it technically cannot be addressed except by a member or the vice president. Attaches said Barclay shattered precedent by his presence during consideration, since customarily only members of other parliamentary bodies, governors or former members are admitted to the floor.

The Liberian president soon moved to a seat beside Senator Wagner and, after a few minutes, left the chamber to address the house.
