Story of English Wedding Told

Lady Sarah Spencer-Churchill Weds Lieutenant Edwin Russell in Royal Wedding

Everyone loves to read about a wedding, and especially in these war times when the glitter of gold on uniforms vies with the traditional white of the bride's gown. Americans were interested in the wedding of Lady Sarah Spencer-Churchill, who was married in old St. Margaret's in London, to Lieutenant Edwin F. Russell of the United States navy. Royalty was much in evidence, according to the following story from the New York Times. As the magazine "Time" reported, Lieutenant Russell "is related to nobody famous!"

LONDON — Lady Sarah Consuelo Spencer-Churchill, a cousin of the prime minister, and Lieutenant Edwin F. Russell, USN, were married at fashionable St. Margaret's, Westminster, today. This is the third time an American has married into the historic Churchill family, but the first occasion where a Churchill bride was taken by an American husband. Other Americans who married into the family were Consuelo Vanderbilt, the bride's grandmother, and Jennie Jerome, the prime minister's mother.

Lady Sarah, 21-year-old daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough, received ten days' leave from her factory job as a technician in a firm manufacturing aeronautical instruments. Among the many attending the wedding was a group of young women whose acquaintance with the bride dates from the time she entered the factory in 1941 and served in a near-by British restaurant. One of the bride's working colleagues, Mrs. Irene Stone of London, confided in a hushed whisper before the ceremony began that she and Lady Sarah used to peel potatoes together.

The bridegroom, who is 28, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lucius T. Russell of Beverly Hills, California. He is a former associate publisher of The Newark (N. J.) Star-Ledger. Lieutenant Russell joined the royal navy in the autumn of 1941 and after a brief tour of duty in Canadian waters, attended the Royal Navy college in Greenwich, and served aboard the British cruiser Norfolk as gunnery officer until his transfer a month ago to the United States navy. He met his bride in Scotland several months ago when she was recovering from an injury received on her job, and he was having his first shore leave in fourteen months.

Although there was a wartime simplicity about the ceremony, the wedding was one of the biggest social events London has seen since the war began. The bride, brown-haired, blue-eyed, and tall, looked charming in a simple ivory satin gown, tulle veil and long train. She arrived on the arm of her father, who gave her in marriage.

Also in white were the two bridesmaids, Lady Rosemary Spencer-Churchill, the bride's younger sister, and Lady Catherine De Trafford, the bride's cousin.

Churchill's Grandson Paq Two young pages in white sailor suits—Winston S. Churchill, two and one-half year old grandson of the prime minister, and Lord Charles Spencer-Churchill, three-year-old brother of the bride—threatened at one time by their antics on the church porch before the ceremony to steal the show but were taken in hand by the young bridesmaids. Master Churchill, a chubby, cheerful, fair-haired little boy, who at times looks exactly like his famous grandfather, is the son of Captain and Mrs. Randolph Churchill.

The Bishop of Oxford, the Reverend Dr. K. E. Kirk, conducted the Church of England service at the same altar where the prime minister was married in 1908. St. Margaret's, Westminster, the scene of many fashionable weddings in England, was crowded with guests. Every conceivable uniform from that of the home guard and plain battle dress to the full dress of the royal marines could be seen. A large proportion of the guests were friends of the bridegroom from the royal navy and the United States navy.

Honor Guard Formed A guard of honor was formed by two United States marines, four United States sailors and four sailors from the British cruiser on which Lieutenant Russell had served.
