**Angels Show First Signs Of Cracking**

**Beavers Come From Below To Wallop Southmen for Third Time in Four Days**

Los Angeles, the Pacific Coast league leader, is showing its first signs of cracking after setting a blistering pace in the circuit since the start of the season. Sixth place Portland humbled the Angels yesterday, 3 to 2, for the third win in four days, and wrapped up the game although the Angels collected 11 hits to 5 for the Beavers. Skipper Bill Sweeney's men had taken 20 straight until Hollywood stopped them twice last week. The Portland victory was a happy send off for Pitcher Syd Cohen who boarded a train for Texas after the game to report for army duty. The defeat was number 3 for Paul Gehman who ran his pitching wins to seven until the Beavers nipped him two days ago.

Temperamental blowups beset Seattle, too, and while the Rainiers outthit San Francisco 8 to 5, the Seals forfeited their second place standing by winning the game 5 to 3. Lenny Gabrielson, the Rainiers' lanky first baseman, put on the first demonstration in the third inning when he tried to punch Empire "Frodo" Edwards full of fists before he was manacled by Manager Bill Skif and led to the showers. Far more costly, was Pitcher Joe Demoran's skyriding in the seventh. After holding the Seals to a single hit for six innings, and striking out two men in the seventh, Demoran blew up to walk four and allow two hits and two runs. The Seals slammed three more runs off relief Pitcher Speece.

Oakland evened the series with seventh-ranked Sacramento at two games, 2 to 0, on the three-hit pitching of Southpaw Italo Chelini. It was strictly a pitcher's victory for Chelini's mates made five errors. Sacramento's Henry Polly, tapped for seven hits, was charged with the defeat.

Another 3-hit pitching performance was turned in by Frankie Dasso of San Diego to Boost the Padres into a 4 to 0 win over Hollywood. Dasso, running his strikeouts to 68 this year, batted in a home run in the 8th.

SEATTLE, May 29 (AP)—Eight members of the University of Washington track team will take part in the national collegiate championships at Northwestern university June 11-12, if they can get the approval of the faculty athletic committee. The student board of finance yesterday voted to send the four winners of events at the recent northern division meet and four who won second places. They were Everett Pitman, who won the 440; Bill Kydd, javelin king; Dick Yantis who won the discus and Tom Kam, broad jump champion. The second place winners were Bob Smith, 220; Walt Harrison, shotput; Gene Swanzy, half mile, and Ron Garretson, low hurdles.

**National Tire Quota Increased**

PORTLAND, May 29 (AP)—The Oregon OPA headquarters today announced allotment of passenger car and truck tires for Oregon in June as follows: Passenger car grade 1 tires—10,386; grade 3, 6313; truck tires, 6580 new tires; farm implement tires—471. Passenger car tubes, 8308 new tubes; truck tubes, 4679 new tubes. The national quota will be 690,000 compared with 600,700 in May.

**National High-Flyers Coming Down to Earth**

This is not to say the Phils and the Bostons are about to nose-dive right out of the stratosphere and head back to their old stomping grounds down among the old shods and empty barrels in the cellar. As a matter of fact, they'd have a tough time getting past Jimmy Wilson's woeful Chicago Cubs and Frankie Frisch's pathetic Pittsburgh Pirates, who are having a high old time—well, a time, anyway—trying to see who's going to get lower in the National league's sub-basements. **Hunters Ask Doe Kill in Lake County**

Request Made to Relieve Dangerous Grazing Problem For Livestock Industry  
LAKEVIEW—As a result of the meeting Monday evening at the court house, Lake County Sportsmen's association will recommend to the state game commission that an "open doe season" be held this fall in the area south of Lakeview in Lake county and part of Klamath county.

The recommendation also states that enough licenses be sold so that the kill will be about 5000, and if necessary, to get this larger kill, that the season be extended beyond the usual closing season. In requesting the open doe season, the Sportsmen's association cites a survey made by the state game commission and forest service which would indicate a dangerous problem for the livestock industry by excessive grazing of deer on winter ranges. A recommendation will also go to the state game commission for an antelope season from August 15 to September 1, with the area to be the same as in 1941 plus the Big valley district.

A request is also being made to the commission that provisions be made to eliminate any elk in Lake county, with an open season on both sexes, if necessary. Recommendations were also made for the opening of the migratory bird season on October 1, and for an increase in the period of storage on ducks and geese. In the past the storage period after the close of the season has been 20 days, but members of the Lake county club believe that this should be extended because of the meat rationing program.
