

PRODUCTION OF BANDAGES HITS RECORD MARK

Production hit a new high in speed and accuracy at the Red Cross surgical dressing room Monday night.

With 40 workers, including many men and a few women, doing the job, 892 bandages were turned out.

For the time involved, and the number of new workers present, this was believed to be a record production for any class at the Red Cross room.

WRA TELLS DIES OF RELEASED JAPANESE

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The war relocation authority expressed faith today in the loyalty of 12,000 Japanese-Americans released from custody since the Pearl Harbor attack and said public statements that spies and saboteurs had been freed were "irresponsible" and "ignorant."

Director Dillon S. Meyer, answering charges made by Robert E. Stripling, chief investigator for the Dies congressional committee investigating un-American activity, declared that "not one instance of disloyal activity" had been reported from the 12,000 on leave from relocation centers.

Statements that released Japanese were disloyal "reveals a complete ignorance of the manner in which this agency is conducting its program," Meyer declared. He said every internee was investigated fully and none was permitted to leave if there was any indication that it would "endanger the national security."

McNutt Warns of Possible Father Induction in 1943

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—Dependency alone will be virtually eliminated by the end of this year as a reason for keeping fathers out of uniform, Manpower Chief Paul V. McNutt indicated today.

The armed forces will need so many men, he said, that only 22 of every 100 able-bodied fathers still will be deferred at the end of 1943 because their families need their support.

General induction of family heads is due to start August 1. A navy announcement yesterday lowering physical standards for draftees may slow up induction of fathers slightly, McNutt said, but he emphasized that even if

the army follows suit in adopting new standards the general effect on father induction will be "only a delay."

Relaxation of navy standards, particularly on eyesight, coincided with reliable reports that the armed forces have been rejecting more than half the inductees called up in recent weeks.

Inductions have been proceeding at about 300,000 a month. If this rate is continued in 1944, McNutt said it would be necessary to lower physical requirements still further, drop the minimum draft age below 18 years, or raise it above the present maximum of 37 in the order named.

Gas Limits Contribute to Safe Memorial Weekend

The nation looked back today on its safest Memorial Day weekend in years, counting 239 holiday fatalities as compared to 304 last year and an average peacetime toll of 400 lives.

Thirty-eight states reported 104 traffic deaths, 59 drownings and 76 lives lost in accidents involving trains, airplanes, homicide and other means.

Gasoline restrictions, a pleasure driving ban in the east, the large number of persons in the

armed services and holiday work shifts in war plants were credited with effecting the sharp decrease in the number of violent deaths.

California reported the largest number of fatalities, 30. Illinois was second with 25, Ohio had 20 and Pennsylvania and New York recorded 15 each.

California led the states in traffic deaths with 20. The traffic toll was 24 in the eastern states where pleasure driving is banned.

BRITAIN LISTS CASUALTIES IN THREE YEARS

LONDON, June 1 (AP)—Britain has suffered 514,993 casualties in all ranks of empire armed forces in the first three years of war, Deputy Prime Minister Clement Attlee told commons today.

Attlee said 92,089 had been killed; 226,719 were missing; 107,801 were prisoners of war and 88,294 were wounded.

OREGON'S ESCAPED CONVICT AT LARGE

SALEM, June 1 (AP)—R. E. Shields, Mehama mill worker who was shot in the abdomen last Saturday by a state prison convict, was still in a serious condition in a Salem hospital today.

The two convicts who escaped Friday, Merlyn G. Kensler and Doyle C. McCann, are in solitary confinement cells. District Attorney Miller G. Hayden said Kensler shot Shields when Shields refused to let them into his house. Hayden said both could be prosecuted on habitual criminal charges, and that if Shields dies, both could be tried on a first degree murder charge.

Police said they haven't a clue as to the whereabouts of George W. Durham, 33, who escaped at the same time as the other two.

Court Refuses to Review Stephan Treason Conviction

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—For the third time, the supreme court today refused to review the conviction of Max Stephan, Detroit restaurant owner, on a charge of treason against the United States and simultaneously lifted its order staying his execution.

Specifically, the tribunal denied a petition for allowance of an appeal direct to the supreme court from the death sentence imposed by the federal district court at Detroit.

Chief Justice Stone read a brief order announcing that "the application for leave to appeal is denied and the stay (of execution) heretofore granted is vacated."

CONSTRUCTION MEN MAY JOIN SEABEES

First Class Specialist Dan Schreiber of the local navy recruiting station points out that under the new voluntary induction plan, men with construction experience who are between 18 and 38 may volunteer for and be inducted into the navy's famous Seabees. Mechanics, carpenters, electricians, shovel operators, crane operators, pipefitters, steel workers, pipelayers, wharf builders, welders, riggers, divers, draftsmen, surveyors and other construction workers are the type of men the navy needs. If you come under this classification or have a friend who does, Schreiber suggests that you contact the local recruiting office, Room 202 in the Federal building, phone 3431, for the necessary preliminary forms and further information.

Warrant Carpenter Leo Wolgast USNR, who is the officer that does the rating for the Seabees, will be in the local recruiting office again on June 24. Men interested in contacting him on that date should bring with them a completed bureau of yards and docks application and three letters of recommendation from former employers regarding their work. This application can be secured from the local recruiting station.

TRAFFIC DEATH RATE DROPS TO ALL-TIME LOW MARK

SALEM, June 1 (AP)—Oregon's traffic death rate dropped to an all-time low in April of 4.3 persons killed for each 100,000,000 miles of travel, the state department said today.

Nine persons were killed in April traffic accidents, compared with 22 in April 1942.
