## BUYERS LEAN TOWARD PEACE STOCKS TODAY

NEW YORK, June 1 (AP)—Buyers again leaned toward peace stocks, today when the market resumed business after its lengthy recess.

Threat of a fuel shortage in the wake of widespread coal labor walkouts kept most steel and rail in the background while aircraft and other armament issues found the going a bit difficult from the start.

Motors were prominent from the opening on and tobaccos hardened at the last. Many favorites managed to register top prices for 1 to 3 years at one time or another.

Transfers were around 1,200, 000 shares.

Stocks climbing into the "new high" category included General Motors, Chrysler, Chicago Great Western preferred, Goodrich, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, Texas Co., Reynolds Tobacco "B," American Tobacco "B," Air Reduction, R-K-O, Westinghouse, General Electric, Du Pont, Philip Morris and Johns-Manville.

Among occasional retreaters were Bethlehem, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Northern Pacific, Republic Steel, Youngstown Sheet, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, U. S. Gypsum and Owens-Illinois.

Rail and Utility bonds improved.

**STRAWBERRY PRESERVES**  
4 lbs. berries 3 lbs. sugar

Pick over, wash, and hull the berries. Add the sugar to the strawberries, and heat gently until the sugar dissolves and the juice is drawn from the berries. Cook rapidly until the fruit is plump and transparent and the syrup thick. Pack carefully in clean, hot jars and seal. All berries except blackberries may be made into preserves by this method.
