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

ERRIFIC and widespread is the criticism of John L. Lewis and the coal miners for tying up an essential industry in the midst of the country's most critical war in

Its history.

No other work stoppage in the war period has been the target of such heated expressions as are directed at the coal miners and their beetlebrowed leader. Yet it has not been the first

work stoppage, by any means, Others are going on right now. They do not involve as many EPLEY workers, and their effect on production may not be so widely understood, but they are fundamentally and in proportion the same kind of sabotage of the war

People who have had little to say about other work interruptions are jumping into the attack on the coal miners as if this were the first time anything of the kind had ever happened.

Every blast at Lewis and his men may be fully justified, but if it is, the same thing goes for any voluntary work interruption that stops war production in an essential industry and slows the flow of the tools of war to the fight-

The coal mine case has served to dramatize the whole problem of labor relations in the war period. It has embraced the personalities and the proportions to create a national issue.

From that standpoint it has, perhaps, been a fortunate incident. It will certainly be if we realize that every production interruption, no matter how minor, contributes its bit to a slowing-down of the war program and the prolongation of the struggle.

As we have said here before, a single day, or even an hour, can make a lot of difference to a great many people in this war. The last shot may kill a man. The sooner that last shot is fired, the more lives of our men will be saved, the more relatives and friends of our men will be spared the agony of losing a loved one.

It is the will of Americans that the last shot will not be fired until complete victory is won. The thing then is to win that victory as soon as possible, and not to permit any delaying factor that can be avoided.

If you could pin these facts down as a true indication of nazi intentions, they would comprise a development as decisive as the fall of

Only a few weeks ago, Hitler in person was biatantly advertising to the German people what he would do to Russia in his next offensive this summer. He was accumulating men, planes and material for it, he said. If his official radio spokesmen are now correct, he has failed.

All through the long winter months, he likewise kept a bridgehead in the Caucasus at heavy expense in lives and guns, solely as an offensive threat, to again try for the oil he failed to reach

Similarly his preparations along the northern front have had an offensive character. The way he has moved his army about this spring suggested clearly he would strike at Moscow, heart of soviet power.

#### **Tunisian Upset**

THE theory that he has given up hope of holding any initiative anywhere can now be sustained by one other significant development.

He kept pushing men and material into the lost cause in Tunisia right up to me very end. 
