### Lone German Plane Strafes Iceland

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—NBC, broadcasting from Iceland, said today that American army headquarters there had announced "a lone German plane strafed military installations on the morning of June 4. No bombs were dropped and there were no casualties."

The NBC broadcast also quoted American army headquarters as saying that "earlier in the week, another single German plane had swooped down on an English steamer crossing the bay on the north coast of Iceland and dropped four bombs, none of which did any damage."
