FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH HONORS SERVICE MEN

Sunday night at 8:00 o'clock the First Baptist church, Eighth and Washington streets, will honor the service men of the church families with a roll call service, according to the pastor, the Rev. Cecil C. Brown.

The pastor states that there are about 60 men in the armed forces whose relatives have requested a place of remembrance on the service flag and in the spiritual life of the church. Constant contact is maintained with all the men in all parts of the world and many of their letters are read at this patriotic service. Once each month there is a roll call of the names of these service men and a prayer sponsor is secured for each name for that month.

A special call is being sent out by the pastor to all relatives of the men on the service flag roll to be present Sunday night for this service. Mr. Brown states that this service has grown to such proportions that it has become very necessary for all relatives and friends to be present to continue the service month after month. Klamath Youths Winners in Statewide Poster Contest

Dick Prairie and Chuck Green, KUHS students enrolled in the trade and industry program, were among the winners in a statewide safety poster contest.

This contest is sponsored by the state industrial accident commission and the state vocational department. Prairie's poster won second prize among the original designed posters. His carried the title, "Select the Right Tool for the Right Job."

Green's poster won third place in the contest. His poster was titled "Harmless Play May End in Disaster."

These posters are to be reproduced by the commission and sent to various plants and factories throughout the state. The boys in the trade classes are taught to be safely conscious by the aid of safety films, safety demonstrations, and speakers.

The trade and industries program is comparatively new in the local high school but total enrollment had grown to about 80 boys when school was out. These boys attend school one-half day and work on a job learning a trade through a vocational arrangement or an apprenticeship indenture. Successful work on their job entitles them to additional credit toward graduation.
