Four fatalities were recorded in Oregon over the weekend, three of them from highway mishaps.

An automobile went out of control on the Old Oregon Trail highway near La Grande and ran into a roadside tree, killing D. U. Butler, 79, Portland, and injuring two others.

In Portland, Asher B. Keller, truck driver, was killed in a collision with an automobile, and Mrs. Ruth McLaughlin, 25, Port-

land, died of injuries suffered in a traffic mishap near Eugene May 26.

Near Bend, the body of three-year-old Sandra Pinchou, Portland, missing since Friday from the home of her grandparents, was located in the Swalley canal.

Drink Shortage Relieved When Shipment Comes

Oregon liquor purchasers were cut down to a one-pint-a-week basis today under the latest rationing regulation of the state liquor control commission.

John Walker, supervisor of state liquor stores, said only 50,000 cases of liquor, about one month's supply was on hand.

Klamath's weekend lack of whiskey was remedied Monday morning with the arrival of shipments from Portland. Shipments were held up last week because of transporta-

tional difficulties, although they left Portland in time to arrive in Klamath for the weekend buying. The last whiskey on hand was sold Thursday afternoon. Washington quotas received the same reduction.

The office of war information said a survey showed warehouse stocks of tires in the northwest were depleted and synthetic tires cannot be expected in adequate number until next year.

The OWI said mass transportation and logging industries, requiring special tires, would suffer greatly.

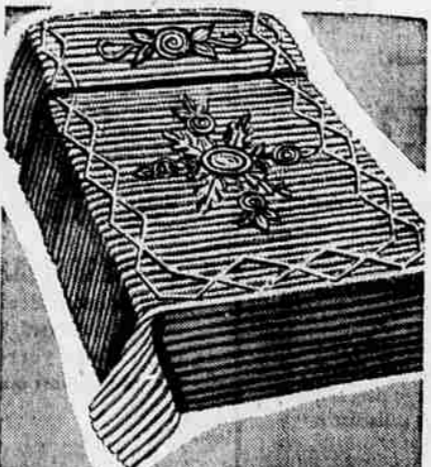
