

STATE RIGHTS HEATED ISSUE IN WATER FEUD

SANDPOINT, Idaho, June 9 (P)—State's rights is the issue and enough water to bury Manhattan Island 20 stories deep the immediate stake in the Montana-Idaho feud with the federal government over a proposed power development to supply Pacific northwest war industries with electricity.

The Bonneville power administration precipitated the fight by announcing it needed 3,000,000 acre feet of storage space to insure a flow of water for the war-busy turbines at Grand Coulee and Bonneville dams on the Columbia river.

Several sites were proposed but two were given top-billing: At Albeni falls on the Clarks Fork river in north Idaho and at Flathead lake in western Montana.

Both proposals drew immediate vociferous protests.

"We're going to fight the project to the last ditch," said Montana's Governor Sam C. Ford of the Flathead lake proposal.

The Bonneville administration advised Montana's congressmen yesterday that it had decided to consider sites other than Flathead lake. That decision shifted the main battle scene back to Idaho where the firework was centered before Montana joined the fight.

"We're prepared to fight this thing out in protection of our state's interest and we shall most strenuously resist and fight any effort to confiscate Idaho property and destroy its irrigation and fertile farmlands," chimed in Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen of Idaho.

Spokesmen for both states have emphasized they had no desire to impede war production but insisted projects which would cause less damage to farmlands were available.

Hearings on the Flathead lake plan were conducted at Helena and Kalispell, Mont., last week. Similar hearings on the Albeni falls proposal are expected to be held here.

Construction of a dam at Albeni falls would raise the level of Lake Pend Oreille, in north Idaho, flooding an estimated 13,000 acres. The Flathead project would flood an estimated 30,000 acres in Montana.

Eugene Millwright Crushed Beneath Headrig Carriage

EUGENE, June 9 (P)—Caught and crushed beneath the carriage of the BB Construction company mill at Alpha, Millard Haupt, 36, Swishome, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon.

Haupt, a millwright, was repairing a power line beneath the carriage when the accident occurred. Funeral arrangements are pending word from his mother, Mrs. Lena Haupt, Los Angeles, Calif.

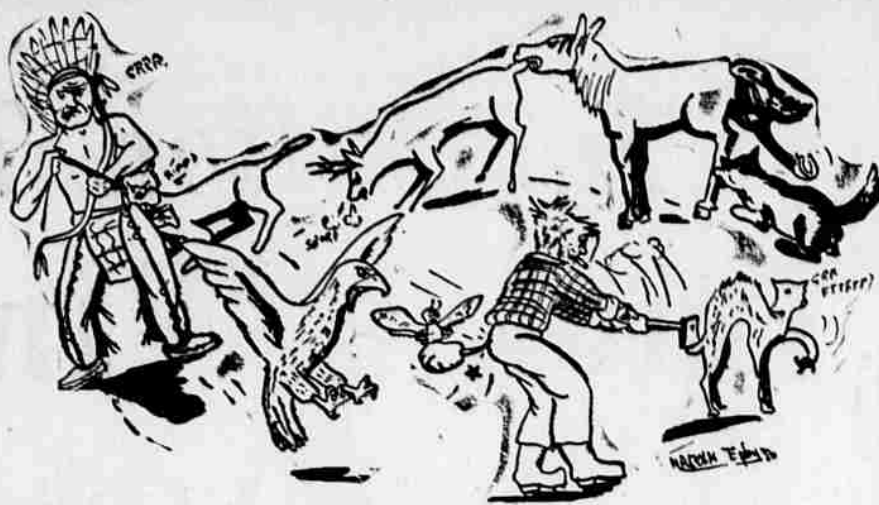
Jan Valtin Gets Draft Board Call

NEW YORK, June 9 (P)—Jan Valtin, author of "Out of the Night" in which he related his activities as a communist and gestapo agent, has been ordered to report for examination to the selective service board in Bethel, Conn., where he has been living with his wife and child. His 3-A status was given him in October of 1940 at New York board No. 11 where he registered.

A native of Germany, Valtin, whose real name is Richard Krebs, was arrested last November 24 on warrants ordering his deportation as an undesirable alien or his internment for the duration of the war as an enemy alien.

He was held on Ellis Island until two weeks ago when, his attorney announced, he was released.

Mother of Marine Guest Gives Thanks to Commandos

The Klamath Commandos received a letter of appreciation from the mother of one of the wounded marines that visited here last month, from the U. S. naval hospital, and stayed at the Leslie Rogers residence. The marine had not been home for over two years. He had been wounded at Guadalcanal and had lost an eye and had a leg injury. This marine had been in a base hospital and at the U. S. naval hospital at Mare Island, California, for the last nine months. While visiting in Klamath Falls he gained six pounds in six days—and when he returned to the hospital was in a much better condition both mentally and physically.

The afternoon this marine left Klamath Falls he asked Mrs. Louis Serruys, the Commando mother, to write a letter to his mother in the east. He said he had never written his mother about his injuries. Mrs. Serruys wrote this marine's mother, Mrs. Irvin, and the letter she received in return told of appreciation of what the Commandos and the wounded service men's project is doing by bringing these men from hospitals to Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Serruys, in her letter to Mrs. Irvin, told about the Commandos, what the entire community of Klamath Falls was doing to help with this worthy project. She told about them being guests of the different civic clubs while here, visiting the W. C. Dalton ranch, the Guy and Chet Barton ranches—and tried to give a picture of what was done for these men. She then explained how these wounded men should always feel proud instead of ever feeling inferior—and that they could still go on and carry out any program they had planned for their life before entering the marine corps—and losing an eye. She explained how important it was to these wounded men—to have their own family accept them without showing any facial expression that these boys looked different—but, to encourage them by ignoring any change in their looks.

The letter received from this marine's mother was inspiring. It proved what was done by this community and the Commandos materially helped this marine and his family. Here is the letter in part:

"I hardly know how to start this letter. I can't think of words that would express our feelings and thanks to you, for the great kindness you have done us. We have been so relieved. We have just not been able to find out too much from Jerry. He has always been very close with his

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FIVE NEW MOTOR LAWS EFFECTIVE

SALEM, June 9 (P)—Five new laws affecting motor vehicle owners became effective today, the state department said in a summary.

The laws are: The financial responsibility law providing that persons involved in traffic accidents must show proof of financial responsibility or have their drivers' licenses and registration plates revoked.

Repeal of the law requiring every driver to be examined every four years.

Extension of the 1941-43 drivers' licenses until June 30, 1945.

Reduction of the cost of drivers' licenses from \$1.50 to \$1.25.

Permitting the moving of unlicensed vehicles through the state for the flat fee of \$1 for each trip.

ADY PUMPS TO BE INSTALLED SOON

Three pumps will be installed at Ady early next week to relieve the Lower Klamath lake situation. The pumps will drain water from the lake on the California side of the border and pump it into the Klamath river.

Each of the three pumps has a 75 cubic foot per second capacity. Installation is now waiting on the arrival of motors, which are expected next week.

Other pumps operated by the reclamation project are all in operation at the present time.

New Log Brand Law Effective

SALEM, June 9 (P)—Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg today began mailing forms to aid western Oregon loggers in applying for log brands under a new law effective today.

About 75 loggers have laid claim to hundreds of different brands.

The law was designed to prevent loss of logs. Millions of feet of unbranded logs were lost in recent Willamette and Columbia river floods. Branding will permit such logs to be reclaimed by their owners, and also will curb logging thefts.

Search for Child Near Rogue River Enters Second Day

GRANTS PASS, June 9 (P)—No trace of Lawrence Cooper, missing two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Cooper, has been found here in a two-day search of the Rogue river.

The child is believed to have fallen into the stream Monday morning about 10:30 when he followed his father to a chicken house located on a 30-foot bank above the river, near his home two miles east of Grants Pass.

Police officers have dragged the river near the spot, and this morning moved operations farther down stream near a group of sand bars in shallower water.

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BYRNES DENIES POLITICAL AIMS

WASHINGTON, June 9 (P)—James F. Byrnes, war mobilization director, said today he had no ambition to be vice president and under no circumstances would he seek nomination for the post.

Byrnes made the statement in response to questions at his first press conference since he became over-all director of the nation's home front activities.

He disclosed that he had sought meeting with the Truman war investigating committee of the senate and any similar single committee from the house to discuss ways to take up with him things that such committees believed needed to be improved in the war effort before they are

aired in a controversial way on Capitol Hill.
He also disclosed that Bernard M. Baruch, presidential consultant and head of the war industries board in the last World War, will assist him in an advisory capacity and will be assigned studies on government policies and programs.

WPB Takes Control Of Soft Plywoods

WASHINGTON, June 9 (P)—The war production board took complete control today over the production and distribution of softwood plywood manufactured in Washington and Oregon.

The effect of today's order will be to channel all available production to essential war and civilian uses, the WPB said.

All purchase orders must now be specifically authorized by the WPB and producers must get their schedules approved by the agency also.
