be KEPT UP, it will mean ultimate complete command of the air by our side.

GENERAL EAKER, commanding U. S. air forces in England, says our heavy bomber force there has DOUBLED since March and will equal RAF bomber strength by the end of summer.

There is tremendous potential bombing power.

IT'S just possible, you see, that instead of immediately storming the fortress of Europe at tre-

mendous cost in lives we may be planning to take the slower but less costly method so often outlined by the strategists.

ALL this, please understand, is the purest kind of guesswork, and has no standing whatever on any other basis. Only our higher leaders have access to enough facts to be able to judge as to the methods that will be most effective at least cost.

More or less immediate action against the Italian islands and probably against the Italian mainland does seem likely, but beyond that we outsiders simply don't know enough to predict.

The situation can change so swiftly that even our higher

leaders can't be flatly certain of the course events will take.

THERE is always the possibility, for example, that the Japs may start something big designed to take some of the weight off Hitler's neck—for while they have no use for him except as he can be made to serve their purposes they certainly must realize that as soon as he is knocked out THEIR JOB WILL BE MUCH HARDER.
