Oshkosh Plywood Goes Into Allies' Mosquito Bombers

OSHKOSH, Wis., June 10 (AP)—The birth of British Mosquito bombers in an Oshkosh wood-working plant was disclosed today.

Veneer from the finest birch and maple trees in northern Wisconsin and upper Michigan moves out of this factory direct to England where it becomes wings and fuselages for the speedy planes wreaking havoc on Hitler's Europe.

Simultaneously, the company, Pluswood, Inc., announced production of a new plywood, half the weight of aluminum but stronger than many metals, used for propellers and other undisclosed wood parts of "Mosquitoes."

Until last July the factory was an abandoned relic. Rehabilitated, it gave Oshkosh a new 100 per cent war industry employing several hundred persons of whom 85 per cent are women.

But Dr. Monte M. Wladaver, chief laboratory technician, told visiting newspaper and trade press representatives that the postwar uses of the resin impregnated, heat and pressure treated plywood are virtually unlimited.

He said it resists mild acids, fire, salt water, actinic rays of the sun; that it's virtually scratch-proof; has a brown, permanent glossy finish needing no paint, varnish or wax; is impervious to the elements, and can be sawed, drilled, turned.

Woodall Vehemently Denies Mrs. Dempsey More Than Friend as Questions Fly

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 10 (AP)—"Mrs. Dempsey wasn't married as far as I was concerned. . . She was a friend," Benny Woodall, named by Jack Dempsey as a co-respondent in his divorce suit against Hannah Williams Dempsey, told the court today during heated cross-examination.

Woodall, who obviously maintained his temper with difficulty as Attorney Arthur Driscoll plied him with questions, denied yesterday that he ever had been intimate with Mrs. Dempsey as charged by the former heavy-weight boxing champion.

Q. "If you had slept with Mrs. Dempsey would you admit it under oath?"

A. "I wouldn't be here."
Q. "Would you admit it?"
A. "I don't know what I'd do."
Q. "You might deny it?"
A. "I would never have been here under those conditions. I have no idea what I'd do."

Benny, a former fighter and promoter, in answer to a question from Driscoll, said he might have telephoned the Dempsey apartment in New York two or three times a week as he frequently called the apartment to talk with his sister, Mrs. Jackie Griffin, who was there most of the time.

Q. "Was there any married woman you called more than once a day?"
A. "Mrs. Dempsey wasn't married as far as I was concerned. It made no difference to me. I wasn't interested in Mrs. Dempsey more than a friend. I was a friend of both Mrs. Dempsey and Mr. Dempsey."

Q. "But it made no difference to you that Mrs. Dempsey was married?"
A. "Listen, Mrs. Dempsey was a friend; Dempsey was a friend; I had nothing to do with their marital problems."
A. "It was not unusual for you to call a married woman every day?"

A. "She was not a married woman to me. She was a friend—a friend."
Q. "When did you start going out with Mrs. Dempsey—after Jenkins was through, wasn't it?"
A. "Ridiculous."
Woodall, in response to another question, said former Lightweight Champion Lew Jenkins, was "an acquaintance" of Mrs. Dempsey. Jenkins also had been named a co-respondent by Dempsey.

Driscoll asked Woodall what he did for a living between fights when he acted as trainer for Jenkins.
"You don't do anything for a living between fights," Woodall replied. "Besides Jenkins would give me money anytime I needed it."

Woodall said Jenkins paid him \$200 for training him for one fight and \$150 for another contest, but gave him amounts up to \$100 when he needed it.
Q. "It was in April 1941 that your wife was killed in Dallas (Texas) wasn't it?"
A. "I don't remember the date. That's a date I try to forget."

Q. "How did you get the news that your wife had been killed?"
A. "Babe Ritchie told me. I was out with Mrs. Dempsey at a restaurant." (Babe Ritchie wasn't further identified.)
Q. "The date was April 12, 1941, wasn't it?"
A. "It was Easter two years ago."

Woodall added that his sister obtained the money for him to go to Texas and that he borrowed more than \$400 from a friend in Dallas to pay burial expenses. Dempsey was absent from the courtroom for the second day. He is a lieutenant commander in the coast guard and his leave expired today. His attorney explained that he hoped the old Manassa Mauler would be permitted to return to court during rebuttal.
