Seattle Loses Second Game to Portland; Seals Slip Past Angels, 5-4; Oaks Beaten

The Portland Beavers showed that their southern spurt in the Coast league standings was something more than a fluke when they lashed back at Seattle yesterday to win easily, 7 to 2, after dropping the first game on the Rainiers' lot the day before.

Seattle outlived the Beavers 13 to 11, but the Beavers had Ted Gullic. The Portland outfielder drove in three runs with a homer

as a highlight of a five-run second inning, and he scored the final run in the seventh after doubling.

Bud Orell kept the Rainier hits pretty well scattered after the first inning when Seattle scored twice on three hits.

San Francisco set out to salvage something from its "crucial" series with the league leading Los Angeles Angels by coming from behind to win 5 to 4. The Seals tied the count in the seventh with a three-run burst that chased Jodie Phipps from the mound, and put over the winning tally in the eighth off relief hurler Oren Baker.

San Diego held on to its half game lead over fourth place Oakland by devastating Sacramento 13 to 3. The Padres opened up early, bagging six runs off Pitcher Johnny Pitar in the first inning and adding three more off Pilette in the second.

Oakland took its second game out of three from Hollywood, 5 to 3. The Oaks hammered the veteran Cy Blanton for 10 hits in his first appearance as a Star twirler.

Middle Mix Continues in American

Swift Shifts in Standings Occur Thursday; White Sox Beat Tigers, 11-5

The middle of the American league standings is as jammed as the middle of Times Square on a Saturday night.

There are four clubs that can't play a game without changing their positions, or sometimes can't even remain idle without moving.

In two days the Detroit Tigers have dropped from third to sixth, the Chicago White Sox have risen from fifth to third, the Boston Red Sox have advanced from seventh to fifth and on Wednesday the Philadelphia Athletics took temporary possession of third place without even playing.

Jimmy Dykes' White Sox have been responsible for much of this disorder by winning nine of their last 12 games and parading right up the standings from seventh to their present position in third place, four games back of the New York Yankees and one and a half behind the second place Washington Senators.

The Sox, once known for their feeble hitting, walloped the Detroit Tigers yesterday 11-5 with a 17-hit offensive that started with four runs in the first inning and finished with five in the ninth.

The Yankees meanwhile padded the Athletics 8-2 with clusters of hits to boost Spud Chandler to his sixth victory and hand Jesse Flores, the rookie sensation who won seven successive games, his third setback in a row.

The Senators lost ground and a 2-0 decision at Boston as Oscar Judd pitched three-hit ball for his sixth success against one defeat.

The last-place Browns narrowed the gap at the bottom of the standings by beating the Cleveland Indians again 2-1 in a night game and moved within two games of the seventh place Indians.

National league activity yesterday was limited to two games in which both the St. Louis Cardinals and Brooklyn Dodgers triumphed.

The Cardinals conquered the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-0 in a night game viewed by 13,356 fans with Lefty Max Lanier taking charge of the show. He pitched six-hit ball, struck out nine and himself drove in the Redbirds' first two runs with a single in the second inning.

Brooklyn had to battle from behind in the ninth inning to win its game 4-3 from the Boston Braves and it was Max Lanier who received credit for the victory, although big Bobo Newsom pitched four-hit ball and fanned seven before he had to be relieved in the ninth.

Manager Leo Durocher returned to shortstop for the first time since September 28, 1941, and drove in one of Brooklyn's runs with a single. Altogether Brooklyn made 14 hits, but Al Javery kept them spaced until the ninth, when he was batted out as the Dodgers bunched four singles.

Williams Wins For Chattanooga

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., June 11 (AP)—Southpaw Bob Williams, 24, sent down by Toledo of the American association for New Orleans of the Southern association to "look over," hurled a no-hit, no-run victory over Chattanooga last night. The score was 5 to 0. He walked seven men.

Williams, a native of Los Angeles and in organized ball for seven years, pitched a one-hit game for Wenatchee against Vancouver in the Western International in 1940.

Settlement of Babe's Pay Issue Roundtable's Plea

SPOKANE, June 11 (AP)—Spokane's athletic round table has stepped into the snarled athletic department picture at Washington State college with a request that negotiations between college officials and Coach Orin E. (Babe) Hollingbery "be resolved in such a manner that his continuance in his work be assured."

The WSC Athletic board last week announced a 50 per cent cut in Hollingbery's salary. Hollingbery, agreeing that a war-

time cut was in order, protested, however, against the size of the reduction.

A resolution adopted by the round table said "It is rumored that disagreement over salary arrangements for Mr. Hollingbery's continuing his work has arisen and reached a point that might result in his leaving Washington state, which event in our opinion would be an irreparable loss to the state college, to its students, its prestige, its alumni loyalty, its popularity with the general public and, in normal times, its continued growth and progress."

Hollingbery has been at the state college 17 years and is dean of Pacific coast football coaches.

2-Mile Mark May Be Set

Not Many Records Expected at NCAA Track Meet Today and Saturday

EVANSTON, Ill., June 11 (AP)—A glance-back at the best feats this season of the athletes competing in the national collegiate track and field championships today and tomorrow indicates that only a record in the two-mile event is a possibility.

Ollie Hunter, Notre Dame's greatest distance runner since Greg Rice, was clocked at nine minutes flat in two miles early this season. Although this was accomplished indoors, it is likely that Hunter, under favorable conditions tomorrow, may eclipse the national collegiate standard of 9:02.6 set by Rice in 1939.

Hunter appears the best bet for a record, although seven other competitors have turned in marks this season which are better than those which won championships last year.

Hal Davis of California won the 100-yard dash title last year in .09.6, but he and Jim McCall of Oklahoma Aggies and Midshipman J. W. Pettit of Annapolis each set marks of .09.5 this year. The NCAA record is .09.4.

Davis apparently will have the 220 completely to himself. His best time this season is .20.8, which is four-tenths of a second lower than his title clocking last year. The meet record, however, is .20.4.

John Fulton of Stanford has a .48.1 in the 440, compared with the record .48.2; Don Burnham of Dartmouth has a 4:10.6 mile compared with 4:11.1; Ralph Tate of Oklahoma Aggies has broad jumped 24 feet 11 inches, 8 1/2 inches better than last year's winner, and also has bested the 1942 high hurdles mark of .14.2 along with Bill Cummins of Rice.

Jack Chevigny Joins Marines

SEATTLE, June 11 (AP)—Jack Chevigny, one of Notre Dame's great backfield stars and later an assistant coach at the South Bend school, yesterday became a first lieutenant in the U. S. marines.

Major William McKay announced Chevigny's appointment after the former grid star had passed his physical examination here.

Major McKay said that Chevigny will be assigned to Camp Elliott, Calif., not far from San Diego.

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Wild Scene Precipitated By Verdict

Zivic's Loss to LaMotta Starts 20-Minute Boo Campaign; Everybody Surprised

PITTSBURGH, June 11 (AP)—Fritzie Zivic, ring-wise veteran of 169 fights, lost a split 10-round decision in his scrap with Holttin' Jacob Lamotta last night but to a crowd of 11,087 he seldom had won more convincingly.

The verdict—first against Zivic in a home ring in nearly four years—precipitated one of the wildest fight scenes seen at Forbes field in a long time. Newspapers and programs were showered into the ring and the fans let go with a deafening chorus of boos that lasted fully 20 minutes.

Even the slugging Lamotta's face was wreathed in astonishment and a fight announcer hurriedly made a re-check to determine whether some mistake had not been made. But the verdict held—the judges splitting their votes and Referee Al Grayber casting the third and deciding ballot.

Fritzie, who is 30 years old, expressed downright disappointment and asserted in the dressing room that he thought he won easily. He indicated he would ask the Pennsylvania Athletic commission to reverse the decision.

The Associated Press score card gave Lamotta only three rounds—the first, seventh, and 10th. There were no knock-downs.

The crowd paid a gross of \$41,225.
