

KLAMATH TO SHIP ANOTHER CAN CARLOAD

Cans, copper and industrial scrap are being stressed in scrap drives throughout the country, said C. M. Lolcama, local chairman of the tin can salvage committee. Klamath county has already shipped one carload of tin cans this month, and expects to ship another carload in about 30 days.

Fifteen tons of the scrap to be shipped in the next carload will be a gift from the war relocation center, Lolcama said. The Japanese interned there have a very extensive salvage program and fine anyone who throws any usable material away. The Japanese, unable to secure means of shipping their scrap in separately, have offered to haul the tin cans up and load them into the car when it is ready to carry away the next carload.

The cans are being shipped to San Francisco where they are destined by the Metal Thermite company. After being de-tinned, they are sent to western copper mines where they are treated to remove the copper. Steel used in tin cans is of a high grade no longer available in United States mines. The cans are dropped in a copper impregnated water which eats away the steel. A copper sludge forms on top of the water, and this is later smelted.

Oregon has a high state record for the salvage of tin cans, with 53 carloads of cans being turned in so far this year. Klamath county leads the state in per capita salvage of cans. Lolcama said, but is far behind in the silk and fat salvage. Plans are being made to salvage silk and fat through the cooperation of block leaders. Winifred K. Gillen, home demonstration leader, is in charge of this section of the salvage campaign.

CAPTAIN JACK WINS PUBLICITY

The Minute Man also listed Klamath county's purchase of the "Klamath Pelican," bomber purchased with May war bond sales of \$350,000, and reviewed the April completion of payments on sub-chaser No. 895, which was the first ship to be so sponsored under the new campaign rules set up by the war savings staff of the nation.
