County Library Notes

With the world at war today and the fighting being conducted on so many fronts, the average citizen finds himself quite at sea to correlate places and events successfully, having only a fragmentary knowledge of the lands and peoples that are participating. Over the radio comes the comment "Japanese Planes Bomb Tulagi!" We know it is a hazy way that Tulagi is in the South Seas and must be important or the Japs would not bomb it, trying all the time to remember where that map is that we saw in some newspaper last week that had a name on it that sounded like Tulagi. To correct this bewilderment, there has come to the fore, many writers with first-hand knowledge of places and events. Their books are both informative and readable. Facts are presented in a manner easily understood by the average reader. Some of these books are written by newspaper correspondents and diplomats who actually participated in the events that they write about. Here are some of the books of the hour that describe world events, with a description of their contents:

"When you are free, tell the world what you have seen and heard." These were the parting words of Martin Niemöller to Dr. Leo Stein, contained in his book, "I Was In Hell With Niemöller." Dr. Stein, a former political prisoner, who was released after two years confinement with him, tells the whole grimly fascinating story including much he learned from Niemöller's own lips.

"People Under Hitler," by Wallace R. Deuel, is a complete and intimate report on the German people today; on what is happening to them, and why they let it happen.

"Italy From Within," by Richard G. Massock, outlines the rise and decline of fascism in Italy; the years of war in Ethiopia, Spain, and now the whole world, through which Mussolini has dragged the patient, hard-working Italian people, and the low estate to which he has brought himself as a valet of Hitler.

"They Wanted War," by Otto D. Tolischus, is the story of the rise to power of a new world conqueror who has made a whole people into a "living juggernaut of Mars," told by the winner of the Pulitzer Prize for distinguished foreign correspondence.

"The Conqueror," by Robert Carse, is a story of the indomitable fight for freedom by the peoples of Europe, whom the nazis have overrun but not conquered.

"The Men Around Churchill," by René Kraus, tells about the fourteen great leaders of Britain who, with Churchill, are making history today: Halifax, Anthony Eden, Ernest Bevin, Sir Archibald Wavell, Beaverbrook and others.

"I Built a Temple for Peace, the Life of Edward Benes," by Edward Hitchcock, is the complete biography of the co-founder and last president of Czechoslovakia, one of the truly heroic actors in the drama of contemporary Europe.

"Return to the Future," by Sigrid Undset, Norway's great

Noble Prize winner, tells the story of her escape from nazi invaders of her homeland in 1940, and discusses the world situation as she saw it on her long journey to safety in the United States.

"Versailles Twenty Years After," by Birdsall, declares the present war in Europe raises the eternal fundamental questions of lasting peace with which the United States is seriously concerned. This realistic new study of the Treaty of Versailles comes, therefore, at an opportune and important focal point for American opinion today.

"The War At Sea," by Gilbert Cant, is the first comprehensive account of the naval war, including our opening battles in the Pacific.

"Year of the Wild Boar," by Helen Mears, is an intimate personalized account of the daily life of the Japanese. Miss Mears lived among them in their cities, towns and fishing villages and is able to give an authentic picture of the Japanese personality and culture.

"My Country and My People," by Lin YuTang, though not a new book, is a splendid treatise on the racial, psychological, and mental traits of the Chinese people and the specific aspects of their life such as—woman's life, social and political life, literary life, and artistic life.

Many books have been written about the two Americas from the North American viewpoint, but "Latin America Speaks," by Luis Quintanilla, the distinguished counselor of the Mexican Embassy in Washington, gives the Latin American outlook. That the Americas are marching rapidly to their destiny—Union, is the theme for a timely and inspiring book, "Free Men of America," by Ezequiel Padilla.

"War Words," by W. Cabell Greet, was compiled as an aid to the pronunciation of the names in the news for the speakers on the Columbia Broadcasting System.
