Soroptimists Hear President of Klamath County Health Association at Meeting Thursday

The Soroptimist club enjoyed an interesting and instructive meeting Thursday when Mr. Vance Vaupel, president of the Klamath County Health association, spoke to the group on the work of the Klamath County Health association.

Mr. Vaupel defined the three groups, the Klamath county health unit, which is the health unit building; the Klamath county health board, the governing body for the health unit, and the Klamath County Public Health association, the lay group, which conducts the tuberculosis seal sale annually.

The Soroptimists were informed that last year's sale was the largest in the history of the county and that usually seventy-five per cent to eighty per cent of the money remains in Klamath county to be used in furthering the work against tuberculosis. Literature is being distributed to the schools and fifteen showings of movie films have been made.

A more extensive educational program has been planned for this year with additional films showing the work being done to prevent the spread of tuberculosis. Books have been purchased for the schools and the libraries. The industrial tuberculosis testing of people closely associated with the war effort is one of the big features of the work planned for this year. Two shifts of Cal Pine workers have already been tested and other plants will follow.

Rev. E. V. Haynes, the educational director of the Klamath County Health Association, showed the latest movie film on the prevention of tuberculosis in Middletown, which the club enjoyed immensely.
