

Evans Honored By Stars, Masons

Affair Given at Chiloquin Wednesday Evening Before Couple's Departure

Fifty Masons and Eastern Stars, with their children, honored Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Evans on Wednesday evening at a half past six o'clock dinner at the Masonic hall in Chiloquin.

Mr. William Morande, in a special tribute, stressed the inestimable contributions which Mr. and Mrs. Evans have made, both in the community and in the Masonic and Star organizations since they came to Chiloquin to make their home in September, 1927, and, as he presented the farewell gift from those present, a silver tea service, he expressed the deep loss which would be felt at their departure.
