TULELAKE—Thousands of surgical dressings left Tulelake in May and response to recent calls for help have been most satisfactory, it was announced this week by Mrs. A. E. Ryckman, publicity chairman.

At the meeting Thursday afternoon, 21 women were present and 580 dressings were completed.

Mrs. Don Kurtz, chairman of the surgical dressing division reported that 35,040 dressings were completed in May with 58 workers putting in 372 hours. Mrs. Frank Rhodes of the sewing division reported at the recent executive meeting that seven women worked 80 hours finishing 20 blouses for women.

Mrs. George Yost of the home service department has made four trips to the WRA project at Newell, has conferred with Dr. J. R. Barr on medical help for families and has collected a huge quota of books and magazines for those in the armed forces.

The project now being undertaken with the USO, is collection of reading lamps for the military personnel at Newell and films for their movie projectors.
