

Pelicans Baseball Club to Play Newell Army Sunday

Several Standout Players Added to Local Nine; Game to Be in Southend

The Klamath Pelican "war edition" baseball team will again face the strong Camp Newell army nine at Camp Newell this Sunday afternoon. With only one win so far this year, and that against the high school All-Stars, the Pelicans will be out for a victory, and will be seeking revenge for an earlier setback by the army outfit.

Sunday's game may tell a

different story as the Pelicans will be greatly strengthened by the addition of several standout players since that first Camp Newell game. Additional players are Bart Goldbar, Romo Crespi, Bill Kennerley (who has just arrived from San Francisco), Floyd Shipman, Aldo Bellotti, Jim Bocchi and Barnhill.

The Camp Newell team boasts many outstanding former semi-pro and professionals on their roster, and should prove to be plenty stubborn on the field as they were in the last encounter with the Pelicans. The probable Camp Newell lineup is: Minar 2b, Chrisman 3b, Bertolina cf, Kirkland c, Cox ss, Youngblood lf, Hutchenson 1b, Sutton rf, Bollinger p.

Chrisman, a former semi-pro star back east, shone for the army nine in the last game, getting four hits in five times to the plate, while Bollinger pitched sensational ball with his wide sweeping curve ball and hopping fast ball. Both boys will be in tomorrow's game.

The Pelican lineup will read something like this, if no changes are made between now and game time: "Scotty" Smith 2b, Jim Bocchi 1b, Hi Hatfield cf, Bart Goldbar lf, Virgil Gross or McKenney 3b, Romo Crespi or Bill Kennerley rf, Virgil Haines, Aldo Bellotti and Barnhill p. Last year's sensational pitcher, Virgil Haines, is in top shape now and may be ready for Sunday's game. Marshall Eyestone is not over a recent illness and will not be ready for this game, but will manage the team from the bench.

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Armstrong Winner in Close Bout

Henry Gets Decision But Angott's Bid Makes Return Match Likely

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—The secret of perpetual motion, a little trick that some of our best back-busting brains thought Henry Armstrong had solved all along, is still just as much a mystery to Sammy Angott as ever.

Lt. Mr. Perpetual Motion, better known as Henry the Hammer, left Madison Square garden last night with a 10-round decision over Sammy in the blood-and-thunder battle of the "comeback kids." Yet, in spite of the unanimous verdict of two judges and a referee, there were more than enough ring-siders believing Sammy was no worse than a "foto finish" to warrant a return rattle between the two.

As a matter of fact, The Associated Press score card gave Sammy the fight, five rounds to four, with one even. It was so close Promoter Mike Jacobs, who had the pleasure of counting a \$55,502 house from a turnout of 13,384 cash customers, was more interested today in talking a return than he was in his original idea to square the winner off against Bobcat Bob Montgomery, with Bobcat Bob's version of the lightweight championship on the line.

There's no doubt that the customers wouldn't mind a bit watching a re-take of last night's blood-letting. Sammy went out there by himself with hit-and-run stuff and right uppercuts for a while, and had Hank's highly-touted perpetual motion operations looking like grandpa's jallopy without gas. Then the Buzzsaw took the brakes off and started to come, particularly with a right hand block-buster to the body in the eighth, which made even Sammy think that maybe there was something to this perpetual motion machine after all.

But in the tenth, Sammy caught up with him again—and this tenth heat, if nothing else—probably even convinced the one-time triple-crown-holder that old Pop Time is still the head man. Anyway, in winding up in that final woefully tired and with a badly sliced mouth that dropped blood for the last three heats, Armstrong looked like anything but the engine that never runs down. What he needed right there, as much as anything, was a grease-and-oil job.

New York Violets Threaten to Take NCAA Track Crown From West

EVANSTON, Ill., June 12 (AP) — The east, as represented by the Violets of New York university, is on the verge of winning its first national collegiate track and field crown in history, with only a faint threat offered by the Pacific coast, long-time holder of the NCAA laurels.

Warming up for today's finals over the Northwestern university Dyche stadium layout, NYU had seven performers qualified in six events, plus a mighty potent ace-in-the-hole, Runner Ray Zoellner.

The Trojans nominated six men in yesterday's preliminaries but have no hidden threat such as NYU's Zoellner.

Washington was number three in the qualifying parade with five men set up for the big competitions today and another, Gene Swanzy, half-miler, ready to compete though not required to qualify in the preliminaries.

The northwest Huskies, who may have something to say about where the title goes, besides Swanzy, are:
Everett Pitman, 440-yard dash; Robert Smith, 220-yard dash; Dick Yantis, discus throw; Thomas Kammi, broad jump, and William Kydd, javelin throw. Robert Garretson, hurd-
