

FIRE SEASON COMES TO LAKE COUNTY

LAKEVIEW, June 13 (Special)—In spite of the recent rains, Forest Supervisor Ed Cliff warns that the fire season is here, as evidenced by several fires in the county in the last two weeks.

Two fires occurred in the area of the Big Lakes Box logging operations the latter part of May, one burning over two acres and the other six. Both fires resulted from warming fires which were not extinguished. Another fire on May 26, presumably set by a sheepherder to scare coyotes from the lambing grounds, burned over six acres in Drews valley.

Monday and Tuesday the personnel of the forest service and Buzard-Burkhart Pine company fought to extinguish a snag fire in the Chandler creek area, which was believed to have been caused by lightning.

John Kucera was called to Fitzwater Point in the Dry creek area Tuesday to extinguish a fire that had been set in a snag by a sheepherder to keep coyotes away from his sheep. No damage was done, but it was necessary to investigate and extinguish the fire.

Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Kidwell, former Merrill residents, have returned to their home on Jenny creek on the Greensprings highway after a business trip here.

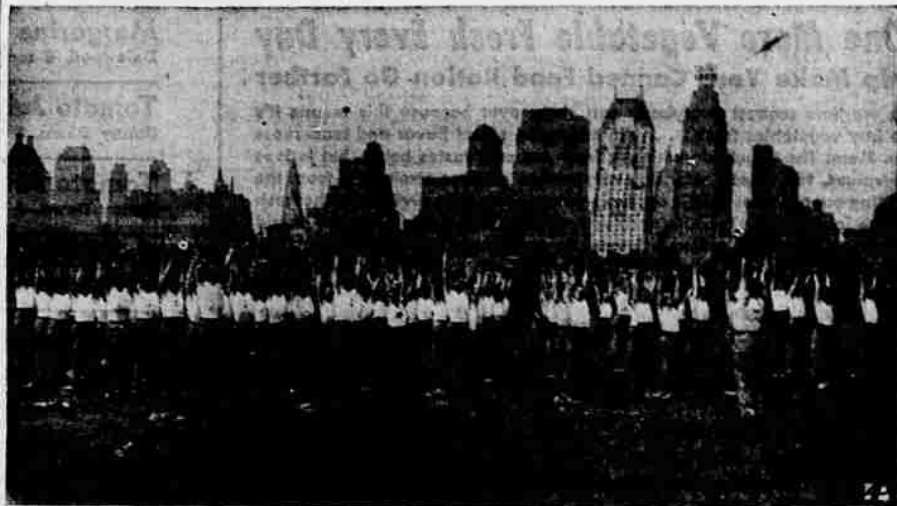

60 HEAD OF SHEEP KILLED BY TRUCK

LAKEVIEW, June (Special)—Over 60 head of sheep were killed and several injured Monday, when a truck driven by Austin B. Lewis crashed into the Walter Leehman flock near the Fisk place on the Bend highway. Lewis, who was driving an oil truck to the airport, took the rise and was rolling down hill when he spotted the sheep some 200 feet ahead of him. He stated that he jammed on the brakes, breaking the brakeroad, but could not avoid hitting the sheep. According to a count taken, the animals killed included 42 ewes, 23 lambs and three bucks. The driver escaped without being injured and no damage was done to the truck. The loss of the sheep, according to reports, was covered by insurance.
