Today's Deadline For Trades

Dodgers Try to Peddle Joe Medwick; Barna and Ken Chase Shifted

Associated Press Sports Writer Today is the deadline for making trades in the major leagues without running the baseball gaudlet known as getting waivers.

Up until now, running a gauntlet has been about as easy as making a deal in the big leagues, but the David Harums of the diamond made a couple of restless moves yesterday that indicated they haven't overlooked the date on their calendar and may do some more important business today.

The Brooklyn Dodgers have been trying to peddle Joe Medwick for several weeks without getting any satisfactory offers, but if Branch Rickey has made up his mind to turn loose the one-time great slugger of the National league, this is the day he might do it.

The club that would be most likely to take him would be the New York Giants, floundering in seventh place and desperately in need of reinforcements.

Yesterday the Giants traded outfielder Herbert (Babe) Barna to the Boston Red Sox for Southpaw Pitcher Ken Chase. Neither of the players involved have accomplished anything notable in the last two years, but the transaction left the implication that President Horace Stoneham hoped to come up with an outfielder from some other sources.

With Barna gone, the Giants have only three outfielders and Sid Gordon, a combination infielder-outfielder.

The Giants also recalled two pitchers, Hugh East and Rube Fischer from their Jersey City Farm club in the International league, replacing them with Ken Trinkle and Bob Coombs.

Another deal made yesterday was the purchase of Infielder Don Heffner from the St. Louis Browns by the Philadelphia Athletics. He will be used as a utility man.

Only three games were on yesterday's program, but they enabled the leaders in both leagues to increase their margins.

The New York Yankees whipped the Washington Senators 4-1 with the help of errors by the Senators and six-hit pitching by Spud Chandler, who acquired his seventh victory against the defeat. The triumph increased New York's lead over Washington to three games.

In the National league, the world champion St. Louis Cardinals checked the Cincinnati Reds 5-3 with the Cooper brothers, Mort and Walker, playing principal roles. Mort pitched eight-hit ball to gain his eighth victory against three defeats and brother Walker, the catching member of the family, supplied the punch. He hit a triple with the bases loaded in the sixth inning.

The Boston Braves beat the Brooklyn Dodgers 4-3 in a twilight tussle to take their five-game series 3 to 2. Each game was decided by one run. Connie

Three National Swimming Marks Cracked at S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15 (AP)—Three national swimming records fell at the far western champions held here over the weekend.

Ann Curtis of San Francisco carried off two of them, the American long course record in the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 1:02.5, and the 220-yard free style in 2:33.8. Suzanne Zimmermann of Portland cut two seconds off the National long course 150 yard individual medley with her time of 1:54.2.

Miss Curtis beat the 100 yard freestyle previous time half a second, and the 220 yard free style record by 1.4 seconds.

The Multnomah Athletic club of Portland won the meet with 43 points. San Francisco's Crystal Plunge placed second with 31 and Florence Chambers school of San Diego came third with 6.

Miss Curtis took further honors by winning the meet championship in the 440 and 220 yard freestyle events. Miss Zimmermann took the 100 yard backstroke and the 150 yard individual medley to round out her participation.

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6000-Doe Tag Plan Draws Spirited Opposition Here

The announcement that the game commission had tentatively decided on 6000 doe tags to be issued in Klamath and Lake counties drew spirited opposition from sportsmen's associations here which had already gone on record opposing doe shooting in Klamath county or "not more than 1000 doe tags" to be issued in the area.

John Ebinger, president of the Klamath Sportsmen's association and the Izaak Walton league, said he was "shocked at the news that the game commission had authorized the issuance of such a large number of the tags."

"It is the opinion of the Sportsmen's association and the Izaak Walton league that any such large slaughter of does would decimate the deer herd far beyond any reasonable need and

would be a serious setback to deer propagation and to the heavy hunting that will undoubtedly follow the war. Our two organizations will do their utmost to obtain a very substantial downward revision of the tentative doe license figures and trust that the game commission will use better judgment than that which dictated the previous decision."

Portland Still Has Chance For First Division Spot; Seattle to Play Padres

More than a little bucked up by taking a series from Portland, the Seattle Rainiers are prepared today to take on third-place San Diego in the Padres lone appearance on the Rainier field during the 1943 Coast league season.

Portland, on the other hand, has high aspiration for continuing its first division bid. 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which dictated the previous decision."

The two organizations had previously sent identical wires to the game commission urging if any doe shooting is legalized that no more than 1000 doe tags be issued for this area. The wires were sent as the result of a joint survey made by the forest service and the game commission showing that in all the winter feeding grounds in the Klamath-Lake district there were less than 13,000 deer of all kinds.

"If 6000 of these are killed," Ebinger said, "it will practically eliminate the breeding stock in these two counties."

The survey was made in January, February and March of this year, and covered all the winter feeding grounds in the area.
