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## DEMONSTRATIONS START NEXT WEEK

Beginning next week, Home Demonstration Agent Winnifred K. Gillen will hold a series of food preservation demonstrations throughout the county. Communities will be given the type of information they especially desire.

The first demonstration will be held at Altamont, in the home economics room of the school, and will start at 2 p. m. Freezing and drying foods will be demonstrated. Wednesday a freezing and drying demonstration will be held at Bonanza high school in the home economics room at 2 p. m. Thursday at the Henley high school home economics room, drying and freezing will be demonstrated at 2 p. m. Instructions on drying food will be given at 2 p. m., at Shasta on Friday.

Other demonstrations are scheduled for presentation in the county. Places, time and dates of these demonstrations will be announced later. Demonstrations are to be held at Chiloquin, Fairhaven, Merrill, Malin, Sprague River, Weyerhaeuser camp number 6, Bly, Modoc Point, and at Midland.

In drying demonstrations, it is expected that the use of the electric dryer constructed at Klamath Union high school will be shown. Another type of dryer used is the kerosene stove heater. Greens will be concentrated on in this series of the demonstrations, as they are the only foods on at this time which are recommended for drying, Mrs. Gillen said.

A series of demonstrations will be held later in town at Klamath Union high school. Day and evening demonstrations will instruct housewives in canning, drying, and freezing food. These will probably be held during the latter part of July. All demonstrations are part of the program of the Klamath county nutrition committee headed by Mrs. Gillen.

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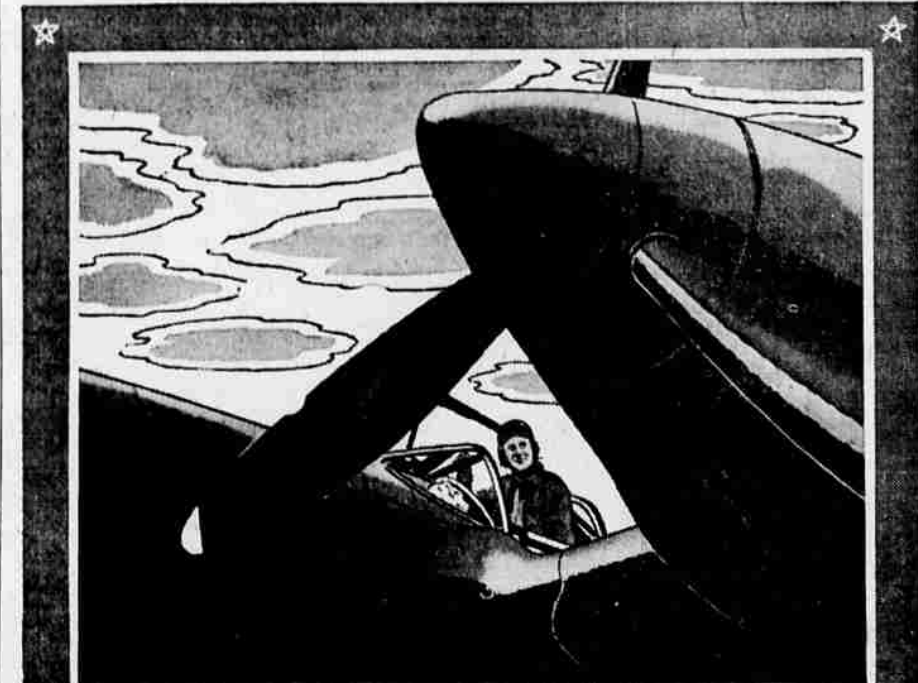
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
