

TWO YEARS GIVEN ON BURGLARY COUNT

Not more than two years in the Oregon state penitentiary were meted out to Robert Dean Johnson, 18, in circuit court Wednesday afternoon, when he appeared before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg to answer a charge of burglary not in a dwelling.

Johnson had appeared Wednesday morning before the circuit judge to enter a plea of guilty. Judge Vandenberg, who said that he did not think the boy was telling the truth in giving his story, told Johnson to come back in the afternoon to give the correct details.

At 3 o'clock, after further questioning of Johnson and the juvenile, who had been with Johnson when the two stole a galvanized can, several gallons of gasoline, and a bolt cutter from a concrete pipe and construction building on Market street, Tuesday evening, June 8, Judge Vandenberg passed sentence. J. C. O'Neill represented Johnson.

The juvenile's case has been given a continuance.

BUDGET COMMITTEE TO HOLD FINAL MEET

A final meeting of the budget committee will be held tomorrow night to clear up all existing details about the city budget, it was announced today.

There has been no decision so far on the over-all figure included in the budget or on the individual expenditures, but this will be decided tomorrow.

A few new features have come to light so far. This will be the first time that the city will receive state revenue for city expenditures. The state highway department will pay \$10,000 to go to the street department for use on city streets next spring. \$1600 will also be obtained from liquor revenue and will be turned over to the local police department.

Pedestrian Deaths Show May Increase

Oregon's pedestrian death toll sloped upward during the month of May when six out of eleven traffic fatalities involved persons on foot, according to figures compiled in the office of Bob Farrell, secretary of state.

As a result of the May toll, pedestrian fatalities for the first five months of the year numbered 29, exactly the same as for the same period a year ago. "In view of the fact that traffic deaths as a whole are lower this year than in 1942, the pedestrian total this year is worse than a year ago because it represents a higher proportion of the traffic accident toll," Farrell said. "Last year, pedestrian fatalities amounted to 30 per cent of the traffic fatalities reported for the five months period. This year, they constitute 44 per cent of the toll."

Farrell urged drivers to be on the alert for pedestrians in the vicinity of war plants and to yield the right of way to pedestrians occupying crosswalks. Pedestrians, he said, should cross streets only at designated crosswalks and at night should wear white or carry something white, such as a painted lunch bucket.

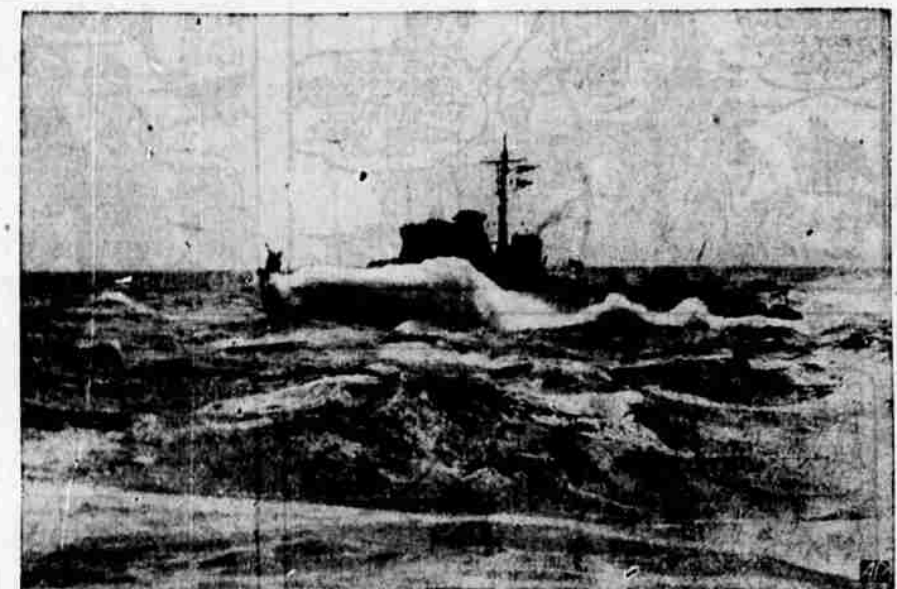

RAILROADER DIES ON CHEMULT JOB

Fred Doan, 53, of Sacramento, dropped dead of a heart attack while superintending work on the Southern Pacific line 7 miles north of Chemult.

Mr. Doan, a master car repairman, was superintending work on a derailed car at the time of his death. Funeral arrangements will be made by Wards Klamath Funeral home.

SERVICE SMOKE COLLECTIONS RISE

Klamath Falls Commandos have collected about \$122 for the cigarette fund for smokes to be sent to servicemen overseas. When \$250 has been collected, 11 cases of the cigarettes will be sent to places where they are scarce and where servicemen have a hard time getting them.

The cigarettes will be distributed by special officers and morale officers of the army and navy at ports of embarkation. They are tax free and in place of the tax stamps will be messages from the Commandos printed in red and white.

Employees of the Great Northern railroad have made a contribution of \$25 and it is hoped that other industrial organizations will follow their example. This is the largest single contribution so far.

Next week milk bottles will be set out in various stores for the purpose of collecting money for the cigarettes. The boxes have this week been in 10 places of business throughout the city and in the Commando center.

Merchant Seamen Win Long Struggle With the Sea

PORTLAND, June 17 (AP)—Chilled by rains and seared by the sun, 25 men jammed in a small lifeboat from their tormented merchantman rode out the South Pacific swells for 15 days—until an army flying Fortress spotted them as they were on the verge of starvation.

The story came today from George Atchison, 20-year-old navy seaman, first class, who returned home to await his next assignment—one he hopes will give him a chance to turn a deck gun against the Japanese submarine that started the ordeal.

The exploding torpedo destroyed two lifeboats and one raft, Atchison said, and when the abandon ship order was given, eight men climbed onto the one remaining raft, 23 jumped into one of the two lifeboats left and 25 into the last.

"We pulled away in a hurry and had travelled only a short distance when we saw the periscope of a sub break water. It turned first on the ship, then on us and finally dropped back under the waves. We were able to make out Japanese characters on the sides."

Atchison told how the mate knew their approximate position and directed a course to an island but the wind changed and they were forced to travel in circles. Rain fell almost every day and it was cold at night.

"Our blankets were soaked and the few clothes we had on were like dishrags," he said. After three days Atchison's boat, separated from the raft and other boat, tried to land on two small islands but jagged reefs kept it away.

Atchison said he and his mates argued over food to make the time pass faster. Their daily ration was two biscuits and a malted milk tablet apiece. They spotted a floating cocoon on the seventh day. After bringing it aboard, they carved it into 50 pieces, two for each man.

On the fourth day they captured a gooney bird, Atchison

said, but weak and hungry as they were, they couldn't force down the raw flesh. "Guess we weren't that hungry yet," he smiled.

The next day a Fortress spotted the boat and soon a coffee can came over and dropped coffee, cigarettes and canned food. "It was awfully tough rowing about a half-mile to where those supplies fell, but we made it—and how good those cigarettes and coffee tasted! We drank the coffee out of a steel helmet one fellow wore."

Hutchinson Jailed On Assault Charge

Cy Hutchinson, Indian, was fined \$50 or 25 days in justice court Thursday morning after pleading guilty to an assault and battery charge.

A complaint signed by Thomas Watson stated that he, Watson, had been beaten up by the Indian on June 16 at a local rooming house.

Hutchinson was committed to the county jail.
