

OWI SHAKEUP IN PERSONNEL HELD BREWING

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—Look for a major personnel blow-up in the office of war information (OWI) soon—involving Director Elmer Davis, one of his top executives and maybe even the White House.

That was the word today from D. C. Speaker, strictly unofficial but well-informed District of Columbia news source. "Ironically," said D. C., the mythical capital spokesman who represents authentic but unquotable sources, "the row is coming to a climax right after a speech by Davis in which he inferentially decided giving too much attention to personal squabbles in our war agencies."

(At Boston, Monday, Mr. Davis suggested that reporters at Washington might be making too much of the various capital controversies.)

"What's cooking now," Speaker added, "is between Davis himself and one of his best-known aides—a man who has been regarded in the past as mighty close to the White House. Davis, who will take on anybody when he thinks he's right, is seeking the man's resignation, and the individual concerned—likewise a strong character—is reported to have elected to fight it out right to the top."

"Some people have been saying," Speaker went on, "that OWI has been losing a little of its grip over some of the government news it claims authority over—and that Elmer Davis would have to have a showdown sooner or later. This may be it."

D. C. Speaker added: "I admit I don't know when this one will break into the open, but I'll make a guess it will be within a few days."

SALEM, June 17 (AP)—Willamette valley fruit growers and farmers should rely on local residents to help harvest their crops, rather than import labor from Mexico and other places, Emory R. Worth, state employment service director, said today.

Alaska Military Highway Official Name of Route

WHITEHORSE, Y. T., June 17 (AP)—It's now officially the Alaska Military highway, not the Alcan highway.

Brig. Gen. James A. O'Connor, commander of the northwest service command, announced the official designation for the 1620 mile road from Dawson creek, B. C., to Fairbanks, Alaska, yesterday, thereby ending many months of friendly discussion on both sides of the border.

"We called it the Alcan highway at first to include some mention of the Canadian allies on whose lands much of it was built," General O'Connor said. "But the name never gained wide acceptance and Canadians themselves took the lead in urging us to change it."

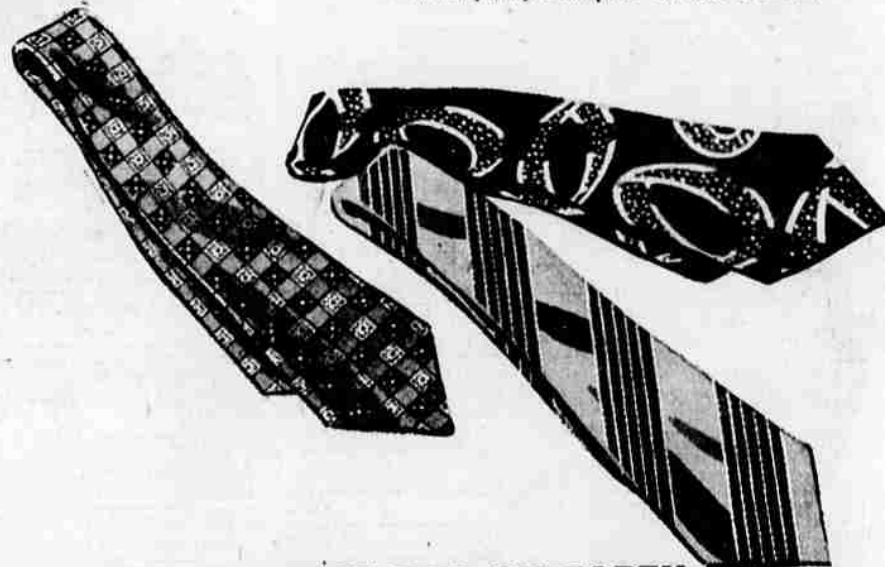
