SPRAGUE RIVER MAKES BID FOR FIGHTER PLANE

The community of Sprague River will make its bid tonight for a fighter plane to accompany the Klamath Pelican Flying Fortress bought through bond sales here last month. Sprague River is sponsoring a radio program tonight over KFJL at 8:30 to induce Klamath basin people to buy war bonds and give the credit to the Sprague River Indian fighter plane.

The Kiwanians of Klamath Falls are sponsoring this month's bond drive and have set as their quota enough money to buy four fighter planes bearing names of four Klamath basin communities.

In the program tonight, there will be talent from Sprague River and two members of the Kiwanis club, Inis Roberts and Jim Burness, who will speak on behalf of the bond campaign. Several members of the Kiwanis club will also sing.

Appearing on the program will be representatives from two of the local mills which have gone 100% on buying 10% payroll bonds.

John Houston, Klamath's mayor, will act as master of ceremonies.
