

OVERFLOWING CLASSES MARK CHILD PROGRAM

The first two weeks of summer recreation program were ended on June 18, according to Dave Bridge, city recreation officer. Supervisors at the two centers, Klamath Union high school and Mills school, report that all classes are overflowing. Four hundred and seventy-six children have registered at the recreation centers.

One hundred and thirty-two boys and 92 girls have enrolled at the Mills school center and 149 boys and 105 girls have signed up at the high school. Daily attendance records show that the majority registered are spending their leisure time at the centers.

During the past years of summer recreational activities many of the children attending were youngsters of junior high school age and high school age. This year the average age has dropped, that of the boys attending the program being 10 years and 5 months, and the girls, 10 years and 3 months.

Monday and Tuesday at the two centers finds the youngsters taking part in competitive games between the centers or engaged in arts and crafts and shop classes. Wednesday has been set aside as the day for bicycle trips, hikes, trips through various industries, or other special attractions. Jeanine Withers, head of girls' physical education activities, took 20 boys and girls on a 22-mile bicycle trip last Wednesday. This coming Wednesday, Joe Peak, head of the boys' physical activities, and Dave Bridge will take the youngsters on an all-day bicycle trip. The main attraction will be a trip through the Kalpine Plywood company plant.

Thursday and Friday mornings the main interest is the swimming classes which are being conducted by Miss Withers at Butler's natatorium. To date, 303 have participated in swimming.

Weekly passes to theatres are given to outstanding boys and girls on the program. These passes are made possible by E. H. Baughman, manager of the local theatres. Winners of these passes for the first two weeks are as follows: Mills center physical activities, Geraldine Compton, Ronald Woods, Elwood Tracy and Christina Nelson. Arts and crafts and shop, James Beckman, Fonda Rose, Wallace Eck and Lois Larson. High school winners in physical activities, Beverly Evans, Rodney Bell, Bobby Doster and Barbara Moore. Arts and crafts and shop, Lester Larson, Barbara Swanson, Patty Teale and Sammy Moore.

"Other plans to create interest for the city's young people are being formed by the supervisors," states Bridge. Work has begun and new animals are being made for a bigger and better circus than ever. A queen and king of the summer program will be crowned at the performance of the circus.

Table tennis tournaments will begin next week which will decide city champions in the various ages.

Seven more weeks are left of the summer program and many more interesting events are in store for the youth of the community. The supervisors, recreation committee and recreation officer promise the city youngsters a busy time as well as a successful one if they attend the programs.

Mexican Laborers Arrive in Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18 (AP)—Another trainload of Mexican farm laborers is scheduled to arrive in the Pacific northwest Sunday, the regional office of the farm security administration announced today.

The 725 importees will work in pea and truck harvests. Athens, Ore., will get 475, and Dixie, Wash., 250.

It will be the third consignment of Mexican nationals brought to the northwest this month by the FSA for the war food administration. A fourth is scheduled to arrive within the next 10 days, bringing the June total to 2600.

LAKEVIEW — The national labor relations board election at the Underwood Lumber company was held Tuesday and Wednesday by Ogden L. Fields of the NLRB. Company observers were Leslie G. Passmore and Ralph A. Alexander. Carpenters and Joiners of America, AFL, was represented by Marvin Erlei and L. D. Parks, and IWA-CIO local No. 6-76 by Edward B. Pearsall.

Of the 197 eligible voters 50 voted for neither union and 44 cast no vote at all. The AFL garnered 75 votes and IWA-CIO received 28. As a result there will be another election between the two unions in the near future to determine the bargaining agency, if any.

ROCKEFELLER LAUDS NEIGHBOR POLICIES

PORTLAND, June 19 (AP)—The world would do well to copy the good neighbor policy of the Americans, Nelson A. Rockefeller, federal coordinator for inter-American affairs, said last night.

"In all the Americas, despite local variations in the manner of government, there is a deep thirst for liberty and a horror of tyranny," Rockefeller said in an address before the City club. "Historically every nation in this hemisphere fought for its

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own freedom and not a few went to war to help others liberate themselves. So it was natural enough that the new totalitarian tyrannies of the axis were as despised in the other American republics as they were here."

Rockefeller added that the American nations consequently worked out "a strong pattern of partnership," the kind of partnership, he said, that is "the best guarantee for peace and security that the world has."
