Klamath Young People Married Before Altar of Episcopal Church; Reception Held Later

The altar of St. Paul's Episcopal church was decorated with white snapdragons for the four o'clock wedding last Wednesday afternoon of Mary Alice Serruys, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Serruys, and Private Lawrence Edward Ray of the United States Marine corps, son of Mrs. J. 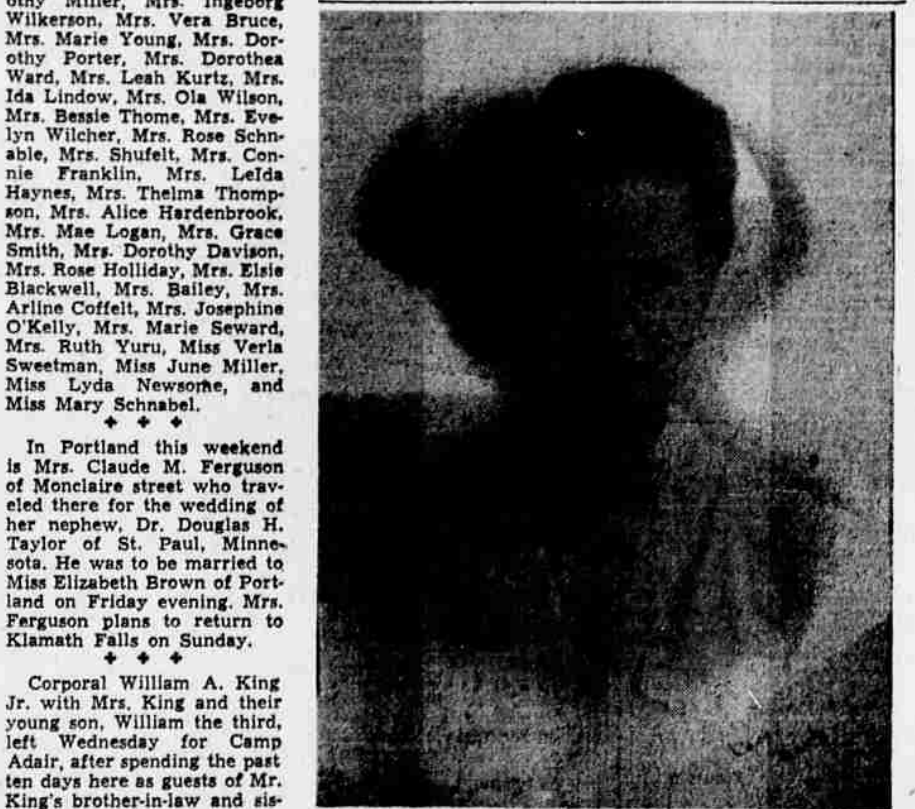
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GRADUATE
