

Paget Hoss, 15 to 1 Shot, Wins Derby

Straight Deal Comes Through to Victory in Last Half Mile of Contest

NEWMARKET, England, June 19 (AP)—Straight deal, a 15 to 1 shot owned by Dorothy Paget, one of Britain's most prominent horsewomen won the historic derby today by sweeping from fifth place in the last half mile.

The Aga Khan's Umiddah was second and Hi Nasrullah was third.

Persian Gulf finished fourth and the favorite, Kingway, which is owned by Lord Astor, came in fifth. First reports had said Kingway was fourth, but an official Derby ruling put the favorite fifth.

The race was worth approximately \$18,000 to the winner and was run in a strange setting, stripped of all its pre-war finery. Unofficially, the time was two minutes, 30 2/5 seconds, which is nearly three seconds faster than yesterday's Oaks over the same course.

The race is one mile and 885 yards and for three-year olds, colts and fillies.

It was the fourth straight year that the race had been shifted from Epsom Downs to Newmarket because of the war. This old market town was filled with England's racing followers.

Straight Deal was the first Derby winner for Miss Paget, who has spent lavishly on blood stock for several years without any luck in the biggest races.

Herald, owned by the Kentucky Derby winner, William Woodward, finished eighth. Woodward was the only American owner represented.



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Greg Rice and Haegg Pivot Of AAU Title Competition

NEW YORK, June 19 (AP)—The race that would have been tops in other years—the metric mile with Champion Gil Dodds defending—occupies the main stage of the National AAU track championships today but it serves only as a prelude to Sunday's 5000 meter meeting between Greg Rice and Sweden's Gunder Haegg.

Twenty-one junior titles are up for decision today in addition to the senior crowds in the 1500 meters, the 10,000 meters and the 3000-meter walk. The metric mile was moved from the Sunday program because Dodds, a Divinity student in Boston, refused to compete on the Sabbath.

He will have Don Burnham of Dartmouth, winner of both the IC-4A and NCAA miles this spring, as his main rival but with plenty of opposition expected from Bilphulse, formerly of New York university but now of the New York AC. Hulse has been clocked in 4:15.9, fastest outdoor mile of the season.

The 10,000 meter marathon is a wide open affair with Lieut. Joe McCluskey of North Carolina pre-flight favored if he starts.

While the Haegg-Rice battle is the pivot of the Sunday program, close competition is expected in all 18 events of the second day's bill. All told, 370 athletes from 37 states will compete in the fifty-fifth annual cinder cone.

Padres Take Rainiers to 10-6 Lacing

San Diego Rollies in Wild Ninth Inning; Angels' Lead Trimmed by Oakland Win

Nothing if not spectacular, the Seattle Rainiers dropped their third straight ball game to the San Diego Padres yesterday by the thumping score of San Diego 10, Seattle 2—and most of it was made in a thriller-diller of a ninth inning rally by the Padres.

Moderately close until the final frame, the San Diego team just took the Coast league ball game and made a sand lot marathon of it, poling out five hits with a triple by Eddie Wheeler thrown in for the caper that drove in the final two runs.

Just to add to the general turmoil Dick Gyselman and Nick Bonarigo collided trying to catch an infield fly.

Meanwhile Los Angeles found its lead in the league trimmed a full game and pondered anew the possibilities of being overtaken by those ambitious San Francisco Seals.

The Angels fell victim of the Oakland Aorns in a 5-0 shut-out yesterday while San Francisco continued in high gear with a 2-1 edge over Hollywood—the Seals' fourth in a row over the Stars. Los Angeles' lead thus was reduced from seven to six games.

Jack Lotz, spacing seven hits, was credited with Oakland's first victory over the Angels in the current series. Paul Gehman, the starting Los Angeles pitcher, was touched for three runs in the third inning.

Eddie Erault, 18-year-old Hollywood rookie, pitched a neat three-hit game but it wasn't enough to beat San Francisco. Bob Joyce allowed 10 hits but his mates kept the Stars in check, and the Seals won in the seventh on Gus Suhr's long fly which scored Henry Steinbacher, who had tripled.

If Leo the Lip Durocher and his desperate Dodgers haven't got a good—or bad—case of the jitters, then they ought to see a doctor about the chills and shakes, because the symptoms are the same.

At this writing, as the Bums are bungling along on a five-game losing streak, it begins to appear that they not only have ceased being any immediate threat to the St. Louis Cardinals, but are actually well on the way to coming apart at the seams.

As a result of the particularly hard work the Daffiness boys did in blowing a 10-8 decision to the "Phancy Phillies" yesterday, the Brooklynns are now only a game in front of the roaring Reds from Cincinnati who grabbed a 1-0 14-inning thriller from Pittsburgh. The St. Louis Swifties dropped a 6-1 night verdict to Claude Passeau and the Chicago Cubs, but it still left them in the drum major's spot in the National league parade by three full games.

The Dodgers, however, weren't the only outfit with a slight odor of gorgonzola yesterday. Celebrating their championship flag-raising ceremonies, the Cardinals committed only five errors and were a soft touch for Passeau's eight-hit hurling. And over in the American league, Joe Gordon had one of his worse days as a Yankee, fumbling two important chances and fanning three times as the Boston Red Sox belted the New Yorkers 3-1. Tex Hughson served up a four-bitter to knock off the Bronx Busters for the seventh time in two years.

Since the Washington Senators flailed the Athletics 4-2 in 10 innings, with Milo Candini chalking up the sixth win of his undefeated season, the Yanks' American league lead was sliced to three games.

Ray Starr painted a five-hit whitewash job in going the entire 14 frames for the Reds against the Pirates. Another overtime outing saw the Indians outlast the White Sox 5-3 in a 14-inning night tussle to take over sixth place in the league from Jimmy Dykes' darlings.

Vernon Stephens hit two homers as the St. Louis Browns downed Detroit 7-4 and Chet Ross clouted a three-run pinch homer with two away in the ninth to give the Boston Braves an 8-6 verdict over the New York Giants.

Trotzky Ready To Return to Indian Line-Up

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP)—Hal Trosky, former Cleveland first baseman, was ready today to end his self-imposed retirement from baseball and return to the Indians' lineup where he established a nine-year batting average of .313.

The 31-year-old veteran, no longer suffering from severe migraine headaches which forced him to retire before the start of the 1942 season, awaited the appearance at Comiskey park of Manager Lou Boudreau of the Tribe, which opens a series with the Chicago White Sox tonight.

Trosky came here yesterday from his farm home at Norway, Ia., and worked out with the St. Louis Browns. He is 20 pounds lighter—down to about 185 pounds—than when he last appeared in an Indian uniform in 1941.

Pro Football Moguls Meet

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP)—National Football league owners or their representatives sat down at the conference table today for the last time before the 1943 season opens—and a majority of them firmly believe there will be professional football in 1943.
