Dodger Tilt Bares Giants Lack of Luck

Unluck Business Seen as Chase-Traded for Barna-Sent to Showers Yesterday

By JUDSON BAILEY Associated Press Sports Writer The New York Giants not only haven't had much luck on the playing field this season, they haven't had anything resembling a good break in their trades.

Recently the Giants gave Herbert (Babe) Barna, a sometime slugging outfielder, to the Boston Red Sox for Lefty Kendall Chase, a pitcher with considerable American league experience.

Barna, who had been a lack-lustre performer for the Giants, entered the Red Sox lineup immediately and began clouting extra-base hits. His blows have been directly responsible for at least two Boston triumphs within a week.

The Giants were criticized for taking Chase, who, on the day before the deal was made, walked 11 men in four innings and who had not won a game this season. But they bided their time and waited for the proper spot to unveil a southpaw.

This occasion came yesterday in a twilight game against the Brooklyn Dodgers and for awhile it seemed Manager Mel Ott was about to win an honorable mention for masterminding.

For five innings he shutout the Dodgers on one hit while his teammates gave him a 1-0 advantage over Bobo Newsom. But in the sixth the Dodgers tied the score and in the seventh they chased Chase with six runs on five hits and captured a 7-1 decision.

The game had to be called at the end of the eighth because of darkness.

In the only other game on the major league program, the St. Louis Cardinals maintained their 2 1/2 game edge over the Dodgers by taking a 6-2 verdict at Cincinnati in a game that was halted by weather conditions at the end of seven innings.

Howie Krist held the Reds to five hits, but it took a four-run uprising in the sixth inning to settle the struggle in St. Louis' favor.

Rice, a chief specialist in the maritime service, has received orders to begin a month's cruise today which virtually precludes any possibility he will have a chance to avenge the 40-meter defeat he suffered Sunday in the 5000 meter run at the National AAU championships.

'Improbable' Pairings Dot Coast Play

Hot Fight Seen Between Beavers, Padres Today For Third Place Honors

By a quirk that probably wouldn't repeat in 50,000 chances, the schedule calls for do-or-die series from top to bottom of the standings so that first place Los Angeles plays runner-up San Francisco, third ranking San Diego fights it out with the fourth spotter, Portland, Oakland and Hollywood settling fifth and sixth between them and number 7, Seattle, taking on the cellar squad, Sacramento.

One of the hottest fights of all will take place at Portland today with the Beavers sure they can rub out San Diego's 2 1/2 game lead and move into third spot. The Padres have been petering out of late and last week were lucky to split a six game series with the submerged Rainiers. Portland took three out of four from Sacramento and expected to widen the gap yesterday in a doubleheader. But weather caused a postponement.

Sacramento may have difficulty with the new Seattle batting order this week. The series opens with a twilight tussle tonight. Hollywood and Oakland, a half game apart, settle a feud tonight at Emeryville over five place.

The Los Angeles-San Francisco series starts tomorrow with a doubleheader. It's the second and last meeting between the Seals and Angels, who hold a 7 1/2 game lead.

Turpin May Quit Seattle For Farming

Rainiers Face Possible Loss of Mound Ace Due to Labor Shortage at Home

SEATTLE, June 22 (AP)—Manager Bill Skiff of the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast league said yesterday he is facing the possibility of losing Hal Turpin, ace of his mound staff, for the remainder of the season.

Turpin, Skiff said, may find it necessary to return to his farm near Yoncalla, Oregon, because the manpower shortage is making it increasingly difficult for him to get sufficient farm labor.

Skiff said there was a possibility arrangements might be made for Turpin to pitch once a week when the Rainiers play in Seattle.

The big pitcher has been one of the all-time mound greats in Seattle baseball history. Since 1937 he has been a consistent 20 game winner.

This season he got away to a slow start, but has won his last three games for a record of seven wins and six losses.

Turpin returned to Yoncalla after pitching Saturday's first game against San Diego. He is expected back Thursday or Friday and Skiff said he probably will make known his final decision at that time.

The question of whether to farm or pitch baseball kept Turpin unsigned for some time this spring, but the recruiting of sufficient farm labor finally tipped the balance in favor of the diamond.
