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FUNDS ASKED FOR NURSERY, GIRL'S HOME

Mrs. Harriett Smith of the Oregon Protective society with offices in Portland, is in Klamath Falls collecting funds for the Louise Home for delinquent girls and the Albertina Kerr nursery.

With the higher cost of living and the greatly increased number of cases this year due to war conditions, both homes are facing a financial crisis and it will be necessary to raise from \$10,000 to \$15,000 from contributions outside of Multnomah county to supplement funds received from the state and community chest.

The Louise Home and Albertina Kerr nursery cared for 424 cases in 1942, 39 of these being from Klamath county. The homes are non-sectarian Christian institutions with religious services for those of the girls who wish to attend. The girls are taught constructive work, sent to business colleges, etc., and Mrs. Smith said that the work is showing very gratifying results with practically all cases getting jobs and rehabilitating themselves upon their release.

Labor-Management Group Formed in Lumber Industry

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—Creation of a labor-management advisory committee for the west coast lumber industry was announced today by J. Phillip Boyd, director of the lumber and lumber products division of the war production board (WPB).

Headed by Lewis H. Mills, one-time president of the Pacific Logging Congress and recently named consultant to the lumber division of WPB, the committee is expected to take "positive and prompt action" on problems besetting the industry, including shortages of skilled labor in the woods and working and living conditions which affect production.

Labor representatives of the group are Bert Sleeman of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners (AFL). Management representatives are Judd Greenman, general manager of the Oregon-American Lumber company and treasurer of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, and George T. Gerlinger, president and manager of the Willamette Valley Lumber company.

Boyd said the committee will meet regularly and work closely with WPB, and also recommend action to other agencies on problems over which WPB has no jurisdiction.

Mills formerly worked for the Mist Logging company, Mist, Ore. His committee will function under the general direction of F. H. Brundage, WPB's western log and lumber administrator at Portland.

LIONS AGAINST JAP RETURN TO COAST AREAS

ROSEBURG, June 23 (AP)—Oregon Lions clubs voted yesterday against return of Japanese from relocation camps to the Pacific coast during the war.

Delegates to the annual convention also endorsed handling of the Japanese problem by the war relocation authority.

Other resolutions offered services of the Lions clubs to the state war bond saving staff; proposed insurance benefits and war risk disability for service men similar to those of the last war; and advocated an active international role by the United States in the postwar period.

District governors elected were Gerald J. Meindl, Portland; Dr. A. L. V. Smith, Silverton; and Clarence A. Humble, Klamath Falls. The 1944 convention was voted to Portland.
