

CAPTAIN JACK TO BOOST LAKE BOND SELLING

LAKEVIEW—"Captain Jack," the fighting rooster who has already sold \$529,000 in war bonds in the state of Oregon, arrived Friday to do his stuff for the bond effort in Lake county. "Captain Jack" was introduced to the Rotarians Wednesday by the new club president, Ed Cliff, and last night took the bird over to the Elks' meeting to introduce him to the boys.

The rooster's first appearance in the interest of war bond sales in Lake county will be at the Elks' picnic on the grounds in Cottonwood canyon on Sunday, June 27. The bird will be put up for auction and is expected to bring a handsome price in bonds. Howard Nolte will act as auctioneer and keep the bidding progressing at a lively pace.

On July 7, "Captain Jack" will see some fireworks when the Rotary club and the Lions club meet at a joint session in an attempt to outbid each other. Each club has challenged the other, with the winning club on the end of a free feed.

In Lake county, through the months of October and May, the school children purchased \$14,064.09 in bonds and stamps. Every school in the county participated in the plan outlined for them at the beginning of the year and carried it out to a very successful conclusion. The Rotary club, Elks and American Legion established a revolving fund for the schools so that the teachers could buy the bonds and stamps.
