Hal Newhouser limited the Cleveland Indians to five hits to win 3-1 in the first game of a doubleheader.

# DOE KILLING FLAYED.

## Slaughter Protested By Hunters

**Willard Hotel Meeting Backs Directors Action, Sends Resolution to State**

Klamath sportsmen last night shoved an emphatic "no doe killing" at the state game commission by virtue of a resolution unanimously protesting the proposed issuance of 6000 doe tags for Klamath-Lake area by that body.

The sportsmen meeting at the Willard hotel heard John Ebinger, president of the Klamath Sportsmen's association, report on his conference with Portland hunters and George Stephenson of Lake county tell of possible ruin of deer herds by the doe slaughter, then went on record strongly opposed to any killing of female deer whatsoever.

This action not only backed up a previous stand taken by the board of directors of the sportsmen, but went still farther by eliminating a phrase in the original move which favored not more than 1000 tags for the area outside Klamath county.

A formal resolution was then drawn up by a committee composed by Dr. George Adler, Marshall Cornett, and Rex Hiatt for presentation to the state game commission before they take final action on the matter at their meeting June 28.

Ebinger, president of the sportsmen, also urged all present at the open meeting at the Willard to send a personal protest to the commission by an immediate letter or telegram.

The effect of the military maneuvers to be held in this area during the summer months on the deer herd was considered with fearful eye by the hunters, though minimized in some quarters by reports from other maneuver areas that little harm was noted in wildlife.

The resolution sent to the commission follows:

"Whereas, the Oregon state game commission has evidenced a desire to open the season on doe deer in that area composed of Klamath and Lake counties, and the Steens mountains area, wherein special licenses would be issued for the killing of 7400 does, and

Whereas, the members of the Klamath Sportsmen's association and the Klamath-Modoc Chapter Izaak-Walton League of America, meeting in joint assembly are not in sympathy with this move, and

Whereas, it has been definitely proven that the deer in said localities have not substantially increased in the past few years, and because of the annual take are barely holding their own; and whereas range conditions have considerably improved in recent years due to favorable moisture increases, and that knowledge of the country and conditions of range and browse convinces us that adequate food supply exists not only for the present herd, but to provide for substantial increases in the future, and

Whereas, much illegal killing of deer, particularly does, is already taking place by excessive poaching the year round because of high prices of meat, and bootleg markets for deer meat are already appearing, which will reduce the doe breeding stock by a large, undeterminable number, and continue to sharply reduce deer numbers for the entire duration of the war, and

Whereas, a great number of our men are now in the armed forces, and such arbitrary action on the part of the game commission resulting in the depletion of breeding stock necessary to maintain our deer would be to the disadvantage of the men in the service in the post-war period;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Klamath Sportsmen's association and the Klamath-Modoc Chapter Izaak-Walton League of America, in joint assembly, go on record as unalterably opposed to the killing of doe deer at this time; and furthermore stand firmly opposed to the proposed issuance of 7400 doe licenses at this time, believing that such act would reduce the doe breeding stock to such a dangerous low as to require the commission at a later time to close the deer season entirely as has happened in other states."
