

CABIN BUILT TO AID SNOW SURVEY MEN

FORT KLAMATH—George Denton returned Monday from a two weeks' absence from home, during which time he was employed in transporting lumber, cement, camp supplies and equipment from Seven-Mile ranger station to a point one mile from Grass lake in the Seven Lakes area west of Fort Klamath. The trips were made with Denton's horses, including a string of five pack animals and two saddle horses.

With the building material hauled, a new cabin is being constructed for the U. S. department of agriculture, soil conservation service, for the accommodation of men taking a snow survey in that vicinity in the winter. They formerly stayed at a cabin a considerable distance further, at South lake, which was too far to make the trip by skis in one day. They will now be able to reach the new cabin in one easy day's travel on skis, measure the snow depth and return the next day after staying overnight. Denton reported that there was 10 feet of snow on the trail to Seven lakes, which made the going rather difficult at times for the horses.

The inside dimensions of the new cabin will be 14 by 16 feet, and it will be equipped with a concrete box for food supplies and a mouse-proof box for storing bedding when not in use. It is expected that the work of building will be all completed by July 1.

Supervising the hauling of supplies and material and the construction of the new building near Grass lake are George A. Work of Medford, superintendent of snow survey work for the soil conservation service in this section, and W. T. Frost, also of Medford, who is in charge of maintenance and building for the service. The latter was for several years employed as ranger in the Crater Lake park service, and is well known here. Two carpenters are engaged in the work of building the cabin.

War Prisoner Camp Set for Idaho

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24 (AP)—Specifications and contract arrangements for erection of a war prisoners' internment camp near Rupert, Idaho, occupied U. S. army engineers here today but no major construction bids will be let for some time yet.

The engineers said bids were to be scanned in the near future but that no date had been set for awards.

The war department today announced it contemplated establishment of the camp.

Youthful Jail Owner to Fight Nebraska City Claim

HARVARD, Neb., June 24 (AP)—Robert Pinckney, 16, clung steadfastly today to his claims of ownership of the municipal jail, despite the action of the city council last night ignoring him completely.

In a brief session the three-man council rescinded the appointment of the youth's father, Dr. C. E. Pinckney, as city physician, approved current bills, then adopted a motion to adjourn. Dr. Pinckney is the only physician in this town of 700.

Officials wouldn't comment on the reason for removing Dr. Pinckney and the doctor said

after the meeting "that takes a load off my mind. I'm not sorry to lose that job."

Robert, however, declared, "I'm hopping mad. The meeting adjourned before I could even mention my ownership of the jail."

He had said prior to the meeting that he had assurance from Mayor Nels Torstenson that "some sort of settlement would be reached."

Robert paid \$6 for the building and four lots, one of which contained the jail, at a recent sale of municipal property. Mayor Torstenson said the jail was listed by error.
