

FATHER DRAFT CLARIFICATION ASKED BY MAY

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—A demand that selective service officials "lay the cards on the table" with respect to plans for drafting fathers was voiced today by Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the house military committee.

"The nation's fathers are in a state of uncertainty about their draft status," May declared. "They pick up the paper one day and read where some official in Washington says they will be drafted in three months, and later on another official comes out and says we may not take fathers until next year, or maybe not at all."

"It seems to me that the fathers should be relieved of the uncertainty they are naturally faced in. If we are going to take them, let's tell them so and let them get their affairs in shape. If we are not going to take them, or won't need them for some time, we ought to tell them that, too."

Other committee members joined with May in asserting they had been unable to learn anything definite about plans for drafting men with children and said they believed the situation should be cleared up.

Stephan Denied Stay of Execution

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—A stay of execution for Max Stephan, Detroit restaurant owner sentenced to die July 2 for treason, was denied today by Chief Justice Stone.

The chief justice's action was reported in these words: "Application considered and denied."

"I have no recourse now except executive clemency by the president," said Stephan's attorney before leaving for Detroit.

Last week the quarterly meeting of the Siskiyou Camp and Hospital council, of which the Klamath county chapter is a member, met at Medford and several representatives attended from this chapter, including Mrs. Dean Osborn, camp and hospital chairman for Klamath county. Plans for the future work in camps and hospitals were made at the meeting. Representatives were present from Ashland, Medford, Roseburg, Yreka, Grants Pass, Dunsuir and Klamath. After the meeting the representatives were taken to the Camp White area and inspected various day rooms there.

Red Cross first aid has added another chapter to the colorful history of San Francisco's famous ferry boats, recently called into service to carry shipyard workers across the bay.

Two classes in first aid are conducted daily aboard the ferry boats which ply between San Francisco and the Richmond yards. The second starts when the tin-helmet contingent boards the 4:45 p. m. ferry homeward bound.

Virtually every shipyard union and a variety of nationalities are represented among the workers who make up the ferry boat's first-aiders. There are some 80 enrollees in the two classes. Kibitzers are plentiful, but many of these who gathered to laugh at "rookie" first-aid classes in action, remained to admire. Today the names of many of these kibitzers are in the long list of applicants for the next first aid class.
