Mob Violence Halts in Detroit as Troops Move In



It took U. S. Army soldiers to stop Detroit's race riots, which started out as a minor squabble between Negroes and whites and ended with 25 dead, more than 200 injured and over 1200 persons jailed. Troops in full equipment are shown surveying wreckage of a store on Hastings street, the one on which hundreds of store fronts were wrecked and establishments looted.

Alert Coast Guard Action Sends Nine Jap Subs to Bottom on Pacific Coast

LOS ANGELES, June 25 (AP)—The concerted action of alert coast guard cutters and army and navy planes blasted at least nine and possibly 11 Jap submarines to the bottom of the Pacific coast shortly after Pearl Harbor.

The Los Angeles Times said today a tabulation of the sub sinkings, although not officially confirmed by the navy, was based upon substantial data. The Los Angeles Examiner said Japan's plans for snapping United States supply lines for Hawaii and Australia were smashed almost within sight of the California and Oregon coasts. Most of the action, the newspapers said, occurred not far off Los Angeles harbor.

The campaign against the Nipponese pig boats followed closely upon the attack in the early days of the war on six American freighters not far off the coast. Within a short time the enemy undersea campaign in American waters was abandoned altogether.

The coast guard patrol boat Hermes sports a gold star on her funnel, showing she has a submarine to her credit. This sinking presumably was in California waters. She is said to be entitled to another for dropping depth charges successfully, a month after she bagged sub No. 1, within sight of California shores.

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Senator Mead (D-N.Y.) today labeled the annual \$5 use tax on automobiles a "pay-as-you-don't-go plan," at least for eastern motorists, and said he would ask the treasury to withhold enforcement until congress decides whether the levy should be repealed.
