

QUIET MEAT FRONT SHRINKS CIVILIAN SUPPLY

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25 (AP)—Generally speaking, it's all quiet on the western (meat) front.

From Seattle to Los Angeles, shutdowns and slowdowns by meat packers brought a shrinkage in the civilian meat supply of the Pacific coast states, and there was no sign of a let-up in the meat-planners' crisis.

Only bright spot in the picture was San Diego. And Tijuana, Mexico, exemplified the "good neighbor" policy as its butchers did a big meat business with visitors from north of the border.

Pacific coast packers blamed the situation on price ceilings, increased costs, rollbacks and subsidies. Milton Maxwell, International Butcher union official, gave another reason. He said he thought it was caused by a "packers' strike."

"They want to break the OPA," he added.

Some packers said they were not too certain of government subsidies to pay for the 10 per cent rollback. Supposing, for instance, a technicality arose and they couldn't collect subsidy payments? Then there were expressions that packers couldn't operate in the prize squeeze between uncontrolled livestock costs and their rolled-back selling prices.

PARACHUTES SEEN FROM FORREST PLANE

LONDON, June 25 (AP)—Eight parachutes were seen to open from the bomber in which Brig. Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest was riding as an observer when it was shot down in an air battle over Kiel, Germany, on June 13, U. S. eighth air force headquarters announced today.

The Americans lost 24 bombers over Kiel. The 38-year-old great grandson of the famous confederate leader of the same name was in the lead bomber and other fliers saw his damaged plane drop out of a returning formation and spiral toward earth.

None saw the big plant hit the ground, however, and the headquarters announcement was the first evidence that at least some of the crew might have parachuted to earth. The plane and its crew had been listed simply as "missing."

Rampaging Snake River Recedes

IDAHO FALLS, Ida., June 25 (AP)—A rampaging Snake river that made lakes of several potato and grain fields in the Menan and Lorenzo area of eastern Idaho, was ebbing today as headwater streams continued to drop.

Extent of crop damage was unknown but described as heavy.

Greek Guerrillas Operate As "Pirates" Against Nazis

By JOHN H. COLBURN STOCKHOLM, June 25 (AP)—Sea-going Greek guerrillas have given the invasion-conscious axis new cause for worry in the Balkans, it was disclosed today.

Photographs published in Hitler's own newspaper, the Voelkischer Beobachter, and the German magazine Die Woche illustrated how the axis is combatting guerrillas whom the Germans described as "pirates" operating in small sailing and motor boats against axis merchant ships in the Aegean.

For more than a year well-organized Greek and Yugoslav patriots, striking from hideouts in the wild Balkan mountains, have been reported steadily draining axis resources by land, but this was the first indication they had taken to the sea.

The nazis employ heavily armed patrol boats and reconnaissance seaplanes to hunt the sea guerrillas, the German papers

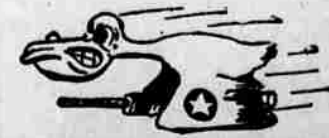
