## Fighting Family Precedes This Young Navy Enlistee

Four generations of fighting men—and not one of them drafted—is the record behind Ericl Edward Finnell, who enlisted yesterday in the navy at the local recruiting office.

Finnell's great grandfather on his father's side, Jacob Halderman, fought in the Civil war on the southern side. Halderman was General Robert E. Lee's aide and stood beside him at the time of surrender.

On the side of the Union during the same war was another of Finnell's ancestors, John Bowlin, who was his great

grandfather on his mother's side.

John Bowlin's son, Robert Edwin Bowlin, Finnell's grandfather, fought in the Spanish-American war in 1898, and Ericl Pete Finnell, Finnell's father, enlisted and served eight years during the Mexican border incident of 1914 and all through the World war.

Finnell is now the only male member of his family eligible for the armed services. His parents, formerly of Lakeview, now live at 514 High street in Klamath Falls.

## BOEING LAYS OFF MEN FOR TIME FAILURE

SEATTLE, June 26 (AP)—In an action climaxing a dispute with the aeronautical industrial district union over penalties for failing to punch time clocks, the Boeing Aircraft company yesterday laid off 175 tool and die shop men and deep draw die shop men for three days.

A company statement said the original penalty of dismissal for four failures within six months had been reduced to two weeks' layoff and then to six days' layoff, without pay. "There has been a concerted failure to punch out at the end of shift during the last 10 days by a group of workers in the tooling department," the statement added.

The penalty then was cut to three days' layoff, it said, but the union spokesman asked that all penalties for tooling department workers be waived. The layoff notices followed.

A. J. Cline, union business agent, said last night that the layoff rule was "too severe a penalty during wartime. The company says it needs men, yet it lays them off. It doesn't make sense."

## PORTLAND OPA MEN VISIT LOCAL OFFICE

Blair Stewart, district price officer, and Thaddeus W. Veness, chief attorney of the Portland district office, are in Klamath Falls coordinating the activities of the field office here with the Portland district office on price and legal matters. They will return to Portland tonight.

The war price and rationing board made its scheduled move into the OPA office in the Balsiger building Saturday, where they will occupy the front section of the office space. The two offices will be separated by a row of filing cabinets. The front door is to be used for entrance to the rationing board, and the side entrance for the OPA.

The war price and rationing office will be open Monday for business.

## FBI ARRESTS 779 FOR DRAFT LAW VIOLATION

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP) Arrest of 779 men on charges of violating the selective service law was announced today by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover in the second report in six weeks on nationwide enforcement of the act.

The largest number of arrests, most of which occurred yesterday, was 161 in New York City, Hoover said.

He reiterated today that the FBI "is continuing its policy of avoiding mass arrests and slacker raids."

Each of the arrests was the result of investigation by FBI agents, assisted in many instances by local and state police, Hoover said.

All of those arrested yesterday were scheduled for arraignment today before United States commissioners in their respective federal districts.

Since enactment of the selective service act in 1940, Hoover said, the FBI had handled 237,732 investigations which resulted in 4371 convictions. He said

the investigations made available to the armed forces 97,681 men who had been delinquent in complying with the law.

ceived through the international Red Cross that your son, Private First Class Carl E. Hollingworth is a prisoner of war of the Japanese government in the Philippine Islands.

Hollingworth was an employee of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company at camp 4 before entering service. He attended Keno

high school. His brother Ralph is now employed by a logging contractor.
