RATION BOOK NO. 2

June 30—Expiration date of red stamps J, K, L, M and N.

July 31—Expiration date of red stamps P, Q, R and S. Stamps valid as follows:

Stamp Valid Date Date
P June 27 July 31
Q July 4 July 31
R July 11 July 31
S July 18 July 31

July 7—Blue stamps K, L and M for processed foods expire.

July 1—Blue stamps N, P and Q become valid through August 7th.

SUGAR

August 15—Stamp No. 13, good for five pounds, expires at midnight.

October 31—Stamps number 15 and 16, good for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning purposes only, expire.

COFFEE

June 30—Stamp No. 24, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

July 1—Stamp number 21 war ration book one of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for one pound of coffee becomes valid.

GASOLINE

July 21—No. 6 stamps, in "A" book, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

SHOES

October 31—Stamp No. 18, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

FUEL OIL

September 30—Fuel oil—5th period coupon expires.

TIRES

May 31—"C" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 45 days elapsing since last inspection.

June 30—"B" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 60 days elapsing since last inspection.

Sept. 30—"A" and "D" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 90 days elapsing since last inspection.
