

KLAMATH GETS SAFETY AWARD MONDAY NIGHT

Presentation of the award given Klamath county as winner of first place in the 1942 state traffic safety contest which included counties over 40,000 population, took place Monday night at 8 o'clock in the county court chambers. Sidney King of the traffic safety division, Salem, handed the award to County Commissioners John Reber and Fred Pope.

Stanley T. Boggess, field representative of the home safety division, national safety council, spoke on home and farm safety. Boggess reviewed fatality figures of the recent African campaign in which 2184 men were lost. During that same period, Boggess stated, 2500 farmers died in farm and home accidents. Fatality figures run "two on the job, three in the home."

John Sandmeyer of the local traffic safety council introduced King who, in turn, presented Boggess as the speaker.

At the presentation meeting it was decided to form a safety group to act in the county areas not represented by the city safety council. This group will be composed of members from clubs and other organizations throughout the county and be under the direction of the county court.
