Mediterranean to allied shipping and thus bringing Alexandria (Suez) within 3000 miles of England instead of 12,000 (as required by the trip around the south of Africa.)

In this war of world-wide communications, that is immensely important.

**OUR** planes batter today the Messina strait ferry from the Italian mainland to Sicily (the short route for getting axis supplies and reinforcements into Sicily.)

**RUSSIAN** bombers attack the port of Taman, on the Sea of Azov, two nights in succession, indicating that the Germans have been trying to move reinforcements into the Kuban delta by that route. Taman is the only reasonably safe port left to them in that area.

**RUMORS** are flying thick and fast in Europe today. Rommel is reported to be massing 350,000 troops to protect the Rhone valley in France—one of the historic routes for invasion of Europe from the Mediterranean.

Nazi motorized forces are said to be taking up positions in the Salonika peninsula—another his-

toric invasion route leading into the Balkans. Unending lines of Nazi artillery and motorized forces are rumored to be on the move in the south of France.

The significance of these rumors lies in the fact that Germany must now protect herself against invasion all the long way from Greece to Norway, whereas we can CHOOSE our point of attack.

**NAVY SECRETARY KNOX**, speaking in Coronado today, warns us that the war may last four or five years more—which, of course, is likely enough. One has the unpleasant feeling, though, that Knox is merely talking to keep us from feeling TOO GOOD as a result of recent hopeful developments—that he's "handling us" instead of telling us facts.

There has been too much of that—since and INCLUDING Pearl Harbor.
