

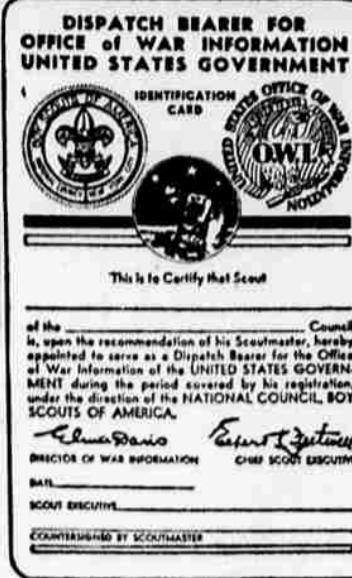
SCOUTS NAMED BEARERS BY WAR OFFICE

Commissioned by President Roosevelt to distribute posters and information for the office of war information, Scouts of Klamath Falls last week received their certificates of identification from K. G. Navy Guard Crew Tells of "Hell on Water" Following Ship Torpedoed by Japs

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29 (AP)—Six days of "hell on water" were described today by five members of a navy armed guard crew who saw a Japanese submarine torpedo their Liberty ship and send her to the bottom in a huge explosion. The attack occurred late in April in the South Pacific. The men drifted for six days on a storming sea and then spent ten days on an uninhabited island where, with emergency rations gone, they lived on snails, eels, shellfish and coconuts. The five were Robert R. Turner, seaman 1st class, Alamo, Tenn.; Benjamin Candler, signalman, 2nd class, Redlands, Calif.; Kenneth I. Bell, seaman 1st class, Nebraska City, Neb.; Arthur L. Alden, seaman 1st class, Kerrville, Texas; and Sam J. Surian, seaman 1st class, Biloxi, Miss.

It was 7:15 a. m., when Bell, on port watch, heard the bow watch cry to the bridge "Torpedo wake approaching off the port bow!" Bell had time only to turn for a glance before the torpedo hit the heavily loaded vessel. The great explosion threw him to deck. It was pouring rain. The men raced to their guns and stood by until the skipper ordered the ship abandoned. Alden said the vessel still was making about three knots when the men went over the side. Every man got off safely, within 30 minutes after the torpedo struck. The shipwrecked sailors were about 15 miles from their vessel when it finally exploded and plunged into the sea. They said fire hung in the air for several minutes after the ship blew up.

Jones Takes Over As Third WFA Chief In Seven Months

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Judge Marvin Jones took the oath of office Tuesday as the nation's third war food administrator in seven months and declared that he is confident civilians "will certainly have enough to assure a healthful diet." Jones takes the place vacated by Chester C. Davis. The Roosevelt administration, in letting Davis go, showed new determination to make stabilization of prices a top consideration in the nation's food program.

Man Charged on Robbery Case

Merle Weeks took time and was in the county jail under \$1500 cash bond Tuesday after appearing before Judge J. A. Mahoney to answer a charge of robbery by force and violence, not armed with a dangerous weapon. The accused forcibly took \$93 from a George Larsen.

EXCESS WAR WAGES ATTACKED IN HOUSE

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—Reporting to the house after a personal inspection of 47 war plants, Rep. Engle (R-Mich.) declared today that "excess wages and profits" were being encouraged by administration policies.

He cited as examples of high wages the payment of \$55.80 weekly to girls "learning to mend shoes which are worn by men in the service receiving only \$50 a month," and factory machine-gun assemblers who were paid more in some cases than top-ranking army officers.

Engle made the inspection as a member of the house appropriations subcommittee handling army expenditures. He blamed "the administration" for "its policy of measuring the progress of war production by the sums expended," and said "this not only discourages economy but actually encourages waste."

Physical Standards In Reserve Eased

Gordon Lee Birtwistle of Tulalake is the latest recruit reported by the local naval recruiting office.

The office also reports that physical standards for the naval reserve have been lowered. This includes the Seabees and makes it possible for some men who have been rejected before to pass the present requirements. Vision requirements and height requirements have both been lowered.

Liskey Charged With Letting Stock Run at Large

Dave and Dan Liskey, Swan Lake ranchers, pleaded not guilty this week in justice court to a charge of permitting livestock to run at large in herd district.

Both men were released on their own recognizance to await further proceedings.

Woodrow Wilson Kin Gets Commission

FORT WASHINGTON, Md., June 30 (AP)—Woodrow Wilson Sayre, grandson of former president Woodrow Wilson, was commissioned a second lieutenant in the army today at graduation exercises of the adjutant general's school.

Sayre is the son of Francis B. Sayre, American high commissioner to the Philippines at the time of the Japanese invasion, and of the late Mrs. Jessie Wilson Sayre, daughter of President Wilson.

Federal Judge Ponders Portland Tugboat Sinkings

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—Federal Judge Claude McColloch today pondered a demurrer to indictments charging Lewis Russell, Lewis Russell, Jr., and Clarence E. Harvey with criminal negligence in the sinking of the tugboat May in the Columbia river last February.

Defense attorneys argued yesterday that the Russells, as officers of the company owning the boat, could not be charged with any possible negligence of the boat's captain, Harvey. Nine lives were lost in the sinking.
