WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Indications that congress might be asked to erase recently voted prohibitions against spending government funds to rollback retail food prices came today from lawmakers charged with ironing out differences in senate and

house bills halting the administration's subsidy program. Completing their first conference on the anti-subsidy provisions in bills adding two more years of life to the commodity credit corporation (CCC), senate conferees said efforts to weld the two measures together appeared hopeless.
