Two Klamath Falls women were represented at the national training course for Camp Fire Girl leaders at Camp Naamanu at Bull Run, Ore., recently. The local women were Mrs. John Kennedy, local secretary of Camp Fire Girls and Mrs. Matt Kohn Jr., chairman of the Guardians association.

Approximately 80 executives, Camp Fire guardians and Blue Bird leaders were in attendance with representatives from Montana, Washington, Idaho and Oregon.

The theme of the course this year was "The Voice of America." The course was conducted by a national staff including Miss Edith Kempthorne, Miss Ruth Kemp and Miss Ruth Telchman, all of New York. Miss Eldora DeMots, northwest field secretary, and Miss Marionbeth Wolfenden, executive of Portland, and several others were also members of the staff.

Raymond Fuller, who was wounded in Africa in April when his tank took a direct hit from a German 88mm cannon, writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Fuller, that he may possibly be sent home on sick leave—at least he hopes so, he says in his letter.

Two weeks after his wound was received, he says, he could count 37 places where he was hit by shrapnel. His left arm was

broken and one fragment pierced a lung, barely missing his heart. He was given nine blood transfusions.

Seaman 2/c Robert Friesen, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Friesen, 1717 Main street, is home on a 10-day leave from Camp Farragut, Idaho. Friesen enlisted April 15. He formerly attended Klamath Union high school.

HOME ON FURLOUGH—Aviation Radioman 2/c Nickie Baumgartner, who has been on a dive bomber in the Pacific for 14 months, is home on a 30-day furlough. He spent two days at Ivory Pine mill and in Bly where

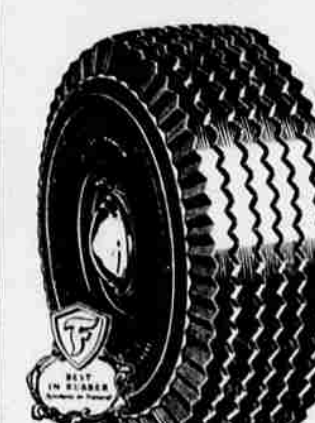

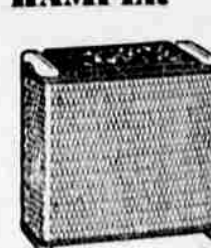
