

COMMITMENTS ADJUSTED FOR STOCK HOLIDAY

NEW YORK, July 2 (AP)—Short covering offset profit-selling to a considerable extent in today's stock market as commitments were adjusted for the forthcoming lengthy holiday.

Principal domestic exchanges will recess Monday for the celebration of Independence Day and Wall streeters generally wanted their affairs in shape to meet untoward developments during the interval.

Slightly higher trends predominated at a moderately active opening, and near-closing prices were no worse than mildly mixed. Transfers were around 800,000 shares.

Among a smattering of new tops for 1943 or longer were Republic Steel, American Can, Deere and Caterpillar Tractor. Resistant were Chesapeake and Ohio, Pennsylvania, Chrysler, Anaconda and Montgomery Ward. In arrears most of the time were Bethlehem, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Standard Oil (N.J.), Western Union, U. S. Rubber, Westinghouse and Sears Roebuck.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 2 (AP)—Hedge selling and profit-taking entered the wheat pit in fair volume today, checking the recent advance. The market had a firm undertone at the start but declined rather easily later in the day when Speaker Rayburn said he expected the president to veto the commodity credit corporation bill.

Oats and the deferred months of rye were off with the breeze.

At the close wheat was down 1-11, July \$1.47 1/2, September \$1.47 1/4, oats were off 1-4, July 89 1/2, and rye was 1 lower to 2 1/2 higher, the gain being scored by the July contract which closed at \$1.05 1/2.

Government Controls Pilchard Industry

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—The government today took complete control over the catching and delivery of Pilchards (California sardines) on the west coast for the duration of the war.

The order for government control of the billion-pound Pilchard fishery was signed by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes. General supervision will be handled by O. E. Sett, in charge of wartime fishery problems in California.
