Vitamin D Patents Declared Invalid
SAN FRANCISCO, July 2 (AP) — Patents governing the manufacture of Vitamin D, said to have brought more than \$7,500,000 in royalties to the University of Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, were declared by the U. S. circuit court of appeals to be invalid.
Briefs in the case said the university foundation had set up a licensing system for commercial users of the formula and that 250 licenses had been issued, all controlled by the foundation. The research was done and patents obtained by Dr. Harry Steenbock of University of Wisconsin.
