Beauty IS YOUR DUTY

"WHAT about us?" ask the women whose hair has whitened. "How can we keep our hair soft and pliable and smartly dressed?"

WHITE hair can be extremely smart whether it halos a younger face or an older one. The trick is to keep it manageable and glossy through more or less scientific care.

IT IS very essential that white-haired women keep their hair immaculately clean, but this does not mean that they should shampoo their heads often. Once in two or three weeks, with a bland liquid castile soap, is sufficient in most instances, provided the scalp is cleansed between shampoos with a special hair preparation. The preparation I have in mind serves as a dry cleaning, and keeps both the scalp and hair sweet-smelling and glossy.

BRUSHING and scalp massage also are extremely important. Just as the older skin requires massage to keep it stimulated and functioning for beauty, so the older scalp needs exercise. It is easy to take your head in your hands and move the sluggish scalp muscles with your fingers. Ten minutes a day should be devoted to this.

Because it is so conspicuously bright, white hair should be tended carefully.
